WEDNESDAY, MAY 21, 1913. A CANADIAN POLICY.

The Prime Minister's final speech in the naval debate should make it easier for reasonable opponents to accept the Government's policy. The defence of the coast of Canada is not to be neglected.

Report of Water Committee. Mr. Borden also contemplates the training of Canadian officers in Canadian naval colleges, of Canadian seamen if such can be got, on training ships, and the addition to the Canadian hydrographic and fishery services of small cruisers capable of furnishing additional protection to the Canadian merchant marine in time of war.

The Prime Minister's arrangement with the Admiralty provides for the development of a Canadian ship building industry. By furnishing work for Canadian workmen and openings for Canadians in coast and sea defence, the Government will extend the National Policy, which has thrown three transcontinental railways across the country.

In comparison with this admirable plan, the Liberal policy of 1910, which was out of accord with the decisions of the previous Imperial conference, was hardly worthy of consideration, particularly as Sir Wilfrid Laurier took ground that made for non-cooperation in time of trouble. His declaration in 1911 that Canada might remain neutral and Canadian harbors be neutral if Great Britain was at war made for separation and weakness.

As to the need of prompt action, we have only to read the speeches of Mr. Asquith, Sir Edward Grey, Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Winston Churchill. We know that while the Canadian naval debate has been in progress, Europe has barely escaped the outbreak of a general war.

erals should urge the Senate to adopt the Government's proposal to add three battleships to the British Admiralty and to build up a Canadian coast defence service. The battleships will not be in commission till after the next general election, and should the present Opposition then return to power it can do what it likes with the vessels.

THE LABOR ASPECT.

Liberal politicians who are committed to a fiscal doctrine that would expose Canadian industries to destructive competition advocate a naval policy that would make work for Canadian shipyards. Yet they know that Dreadnoughts cannot be built in Canada unless we first sink \$75,000,000 in special plants which would be largely useless unless we kept on building Dreadnoughts for ever.

What an old-fashioned financier the present Finance Minister is! He actually applies over twenty million dollars to a reduction of the National debt. This is the Minister, whom we were warned to suspect by the Liberal press.

If Laurier wishes to regain the confidence of the people he must first realize—however distasteful that realization may be—that this country is British and has every intention of remaining so.

(Continued from Page 8.) Over that the council should name a specific amount, say \$25. Ald. Osborne moved in amendment that the amount of rental be \$25.

Section one recommended that a pipe should be laid in the water main on Northumberland street from Aberdeen to Argyle street. Ald. Everett pointed out that there were several improvements in the water system that were necessary and it was considered that the increase in the size of the pipe would increase the efficiency of the system.

Section 2 recommended the appointment of G. L. Bowers to the position of chief engineer at the pumping station and filtration plant, while section 3 fixed his salary at \$900 per annum. Applications for the position were read from Walter McGinn and Gordon Kelly, the application of Mr. McGinn being supported by a petition signed by over 160 ratepayers.

Ald. Everett said that the committee deemed it advisable in the interests of the city that the most competent man obtainable should be appointed to the position. The Factory Inspector had recommended Mr. Bowers for the position and had given him an excellent recommendation. The committee had verified the qualifications of Mr. Bowers, and felt that they were securing a desirable man for the position.
