An idea of how rapidly the Northwest is being filled up through the energetic and systematic immigration policy of the Dominion government may be found (in the homestead returns for the past month, when there was an increase of nearly 1,000 entries over May, 1904.

There were 3,925 homestead entries for the past month against 2,953 for the same month last year or an increase of 972. At Regina there were 1,080, an increase of 268; at Battleford, 566, an increase of 259; Yorktown, 659, an increase of 182; Red Deer, 353, an increase of 218; Edmonton, 329, an increase of 29: Prince Albert, 231, an increase of 64; Lethbridge, 217. a decrease of 10; Calgary, 102, a decrease of 48; Alamedea, 160, an increase of 50; Winnipeg, 54, a decrease of 10; Brandon, 12, a decrease of 21; Dauphin, 33, a decrease of 13; Minnedosa, 19, an increase of 7.


