

\$13,000 OFF IN WARD NO. 6.

CANNOT ASSESS ON FRONTAGE
THAT DOES NOT EXIST.

Court of Revision Dealt With the Cummer Coal Company and Minor Appeals Yesterday.

The Court of Revision yesterday, dealing with appeals from Ward 6, cut off \$13,000, as compared with \$8,000 last year. Of this \$3,000 was taken off the assessment of \$16,000 on the Cummer coal sheds at the corner of Elgin and Cannon streets, and \$1,500 off the business assessment. Mr. Cummer explained that he was assessed for 558 feet on Elgin street, although he had no access to this street, the Grand Trunk under an agreement with the city, when it closed Robert street, undertaking to have no openings in the high board fence erected. As soon as he secured an opening on the \$16,000 assessment stand. The court agreed that the Elgin street frontage should not be assessed. The appeals allowed yesterday were as follows:

KAISER SICK.

WILL GO TO ISLE OF WIGHT AFTER
VISITING LONDON.

Palate Inflamed—Ear Channels May Be Affected—Suffered From Same Trouble Before—Won't Visit Holland.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—The decision of Emperor William not to visit Holland and to rest on the Isle of Wight after his visit to King Edward was taken last Tuesday morning, after His Majesty's physicians had perceived that the cold which he had taken on Oct. 25, while watching the airship experiments at Tegel, had left an inflammation around the palate and the neighboring channels leading to the ears. As His Majesty suffered much in earlier life from a similar inflammation extending to those ducts, he readily accepted their advice to go to the Isle of Wight after fulfilling his English engagements, which were too near to cancel. The climate of the Isle of Wight is regarded as being mild and equitable, and less in contrast with the German climate than that of the southern latitude, to which the Emperor will have to go at the beginning of winter.

MAYOR VETOED IT.

WINNIPEG'S GREAT POWER VENTURE IS STOPPED SHORT.

Cecil B. Smith Scored by the Mayor—City Will Not Now Be Forced to Sell \$5,000,000 of Securities at a Sacrifice—Sobor Thought Now.

Winnipeg, Nov. 6.—As a climax of the strenuous fight on the power proposition involving a sale of \$5,000,000 civic securities, Mayor Ashdown to-day decided to resort to the most extreme measure within his power in dealing with Monday night's action of the City Council in putting through the power contract, by exercising his prerogative of vetoing the action of the council. At most simultaneously with the Mayor's announcement came statements from Ald. Palford, Chairman of the Power Committee, and Controller Cockburn, the chief advocate of immediate municipal power in the Board of Control, that they would uphold the action of the Mayor in registering his veto.

The Mayor also announced he had wired Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, asking him to continue the reservation of the Point du Bois power to the city, could see its way clear to proceed with the work, and had received a favorable reply from the Minister.

Mayor Ashdown has also expressed his dissatisfaction at the activity shown by Cecil B. Smith, of Toronto, chief power engineer, in connection with the acceptance of the Anglo-Canadian Engineering Co.'s offer, and it is under-

stood that when work does actually commence his Workshop will insist that some one other than Mr. Smith occupy the position of chief engineer.

OPENS TO-MORROW.

Ladies to Be Admitted to Britannia Roller Rink Free.

The big opening of the Britannia Roller rink will take place to-morrow evening, and the management announces that ladies will be admitted free and will be supplied with skates free of charge. The rink is situated on Barton street, near Woodland Park, and is the largest rink in Ontario. In addition to the large skating area, there is a separate floor for beginners, where competent instructors will be in attendance at all times. There is seating accommodation around the skating surface for 1,500 spectators. Everything possible has been done to provide for the comfort of patrons by Prof. Smith, the rink manager, who has had experience in rinks in Rochester, Detroit and other cities. There will be three instructors and eight attendants, and there are spacious cloak and toilet rooms. The rink is equipped with the most modern steel skates of the Winslow, Hensley and Richardson makes. The refreshment room will be in charge of Mr. W. A. Crawford, the caterer at Dundurn Park.

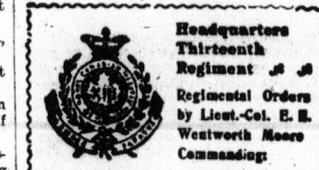

\$40,000,000 INVOLVED.

New York, Nov. 7.—The fight for the control of the Lake Superior Corporation, a \$40,000,000 concern which succeeded the old Consolidated Lake Superior Co., assumed a new phase yesterday, when an injunction was obtained restraining J. T. Tamm, President of the First National Bank of Philadelphia, from voting 50,000 shares of stock which had been deposited as collateral for loans.
