PLUCKY ALFONSO.

IN SPIKE OF OBJECTIONS HE VISITS BARCELONA.

Got Warm Welcome From Inhabitants--Salute From Warships--The City Decorated--Political Amnesty Will Be Granted if Nothing Happens.

Barcelona, Spain, March 10.--King Alfonso, who left Madrid last night, arrived in this city this morning. He has taken up his residence at the home of General Linarez, Captain-General of Catalonia, where he will stay during his visit here. He was given a warm welcome by the people of the city. There was no disturbance of any kind. The royal train drew into the station at 10 o'clock. His arrival was announced by the firing of salutes from the Austrian and Spanish warships in the harbor. The big square outside the railroad station was lined with troops, and the civil guard. As the King emerged from the station he was warmly greeted. Smiling acknowledgments to the plaudits of the people, His Majesty entered the royal carriage in waiting, and escorted by a squadron of cavalry, was driven rapidly to the Church of La Merced, where a Te Deum was celebrated.

Barcelona was gaily decorated in honor of the royal visit. The tiers of balconies along the route traversed by His Majesty were hung with bunting and flags and thronged with women wearing the black mantillas, for which the beauties of Spain are famous.

Political Amnesty. Madrid, March 10.--It is semi-officially intimated here to-day that if no untoward incident mars the visit of King Alfonso to Barcelona, the authorities will restore the anarchist guarantee recently withdrawn from that city, and issue a decree declaring political amnesty.

Runs No Risk. Orleans, France, March 10.--M. Le-rout, chief of the Barcelona republicans, declared to-day that King Alfonso did not run the slightest risk in visiting Barcelona.

DISCUSS BILLS. Several Measures Before the Municipal Committee.

Toronto, Ont., March 10 (Special).--No opposition met the bill proposed by Mr. Munro (North Oxford) to make trustees of police villages ineligible for election to township councils when it came before the Municipal Committee of the Legislature this morning. It was therefore reported.

Mr. P. H. Bower (Kent), explained his bill requiring employers to notify farmers whose land a drain was to cross, of a time and place for the reception of suggestions from the landowner as to the character and size of the drains. The bill was allowed to stand for their consideration.

Mr. McCoig's bill to permit non-resident voters of a municipality to cast their ballots at the polling subdivision nearest their place of abode was defeated. It was pointed out that it would pave the way for bribery and other measures and call for a number of changes in other statutes.

ST. MATTHEW'S YOUNG MEN. An interesting meeting of the men's club of St. Matthew's Church, which was organized two weeks ago, was held last night. The attendance was large, and an enjoyable time was spent. Arrangements are being made for the expansion of the club, and the finer weather approaches it is the intention to introduce athletics. A cordial invitation is extended to the men of the church to attend the meetings of the club, which are held every Monday evening.

BURNED TOBACCO. Brockville, Ky., March 10.--Five or more night riders came into town early to-day in buggies and one on horseback, and before they left 15,000 pounds of tobacco belonging to Robert Stanton, one of the wealthiest planters in the section, had been burned. The men were heavily armed with shotguns and revolvers.

Live Stock.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 74 car loads, composed of 1579 cattle, 107 hogs, 130 sheep and lambs, 76 calves and over 100 horses.

The quality of fat cattle was not nearly as good as that of one week ago, the percentage of finished cattle being small, while there were too many of the half fat and lean kind offered.

Trade was slow, with prices lower than on Monday last, but about the same as at the city market on Thursday last.

Exporters--Exporters were quoted at \$4.00 to \$5.20 per cwt., the bulk going at about \$5. But it must be remembered that a lot of light cattle were bought for export, \$4 cattle, weighing 1,200 to 1,270 lbs. each, were reported by J. L. Rowntree as being bought for export at prices ranging at \$4.00 to \$4.90.

Butchers--Selected butchers' of the city were quoted at \$4.75 to \$5.00; good butchers', \$4.50 to \$4.65; medium, \$4.25 to \$4.40; common, \$3.75 to \$4.10; cows, \$3 to \$3.75; canners, \$1.25 to \$2 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers--The bulk of the milkers and springers offered were of common to medium quality. Some of the cows offered looked to have good milking qualities, but they had little or no flesh on them, not having been fed properly. Prices ranged all the way from \$2 to \$800 each, the bulk of the best selling around \$40 to \$45 each.

Veal Calves--Veal calves sold at \$4 to \$6.50 per cwt., the bulk of them being of very poor quality.

Sheep and Lambs--Sheep sold at \$4.75 to \$5 per cwt., lambs at \$6 to \$7.50 per cwt.

Noon Stock Letter

New York, March 10.--The market during the morning encountered considerable profit taking, but developed excellent buying at the moderate recessions from high prices reached. There is a good deal of satisfaction over unfavorable outlook for the Hepburn stock tax bill, it being claimed that a canvass of the house shows slight change for the passage at this session. It is estimated that the annual report of the United States Steel due within a week or two will show working capital of \$240,000,000, a surplus of \$113,000,000, and cash \$75,000,000. It is pointed out that the Reading has earned 3.5 per cent, on the common in 7 months of the fiscal year, against 3.38 per cent, in the same period of 1907, and this when other railroads have been recording heavy losses. Attention will probably soon be directed to this fiscal year, but by a small margin, unless there is a decided change for the better. A director looks for the regular dividend to be declared about April 1st.

While the market has advanced sharply and somewhat, the sentiment is good, and reaction, we feel that purchases on fair concession constitute the logical procedure at this time.--Emmis & Stoppani.
