Superintendent Miller said he believed he was being discriminated against by labor sheet called the Industrial Banner labor sheet called the Industrial Banner. This paper had picked him out personally and was making him a target for its abuse. The paper was circulated by the union among the men, and after they read these remarks he found the discipline of the road interfered with. Miller said he was quite willing to meet Mr. Reeves on a public platform on the union question.

he changed the schedule to suit the men. The new one did not suit the union, and it was then that the arbitration met and fixed the schedule and wages which had been carried out since that time. This schedule, declared Mr. Miller, was not what the men wanted, and since the award there has been turmoil and strife among the members of the union. A good many of the members of Division 107 have broken away from the old, union, and have formed a new union, and between the two factions there has been continual quarrelling.

Mr. Miller said that was quite willing to meet Mr. Reeves on a public platform on the union question.

Mr. Theaker was recalled, and stated that he held a paper which was an agreement signed by Mr. C. K. Green, Mr. Sahl, a former President of the union, and have formed a new union, and between the two factions there has been continual quarrelling.

Mr. Miller said that the time, Mr. Theaker was ready to the union, to the effect that a committee was appointed for the purpose of watching the men and reporting to the company of any dishonest acts that they might commit. Mr. Theaker said that it was practically "spotting." He produced the agreement, it was read by the board and was found ready to bring witnesses to prove that men had been seen going from the union meetings on a Saturday night or Sunday morning considerably the worse for liquor. He knew that Theaker was not a drinking man, but he did not think he, as president of the union, should have tolerated drinking at or after the meet.
