### DEATH OF WELL KNOWN RESIDENT

A wide circle of friends will regret to hear of the death of Mrs. Pauline Leighton, wife of the late Jesse R. Leighton, which occurred at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. W. F. MacKnight 193 Bayfair Ave. Montreal on Tuesday afternoon, August 16th, after a very brief illness.

Mrs. Leighton was the daughter of the late Henry Vye, and was born at Wilson's Point April 15th, 1841 and a resident of Newcastle until the death of her husband January 19th, 1916.

She was a devout member and a faithful worker of the Baptist Church, and was beloved by all for her many kind and christianlike qualities. The following children survive her: Mrs. C. C. Croger, Mrs. H. V. Leighton, Beverly Mackay, E. H. Moore, Mrs. W. V. Appleton and Dr. G. T. Dighton of Montreal, Mrs. F. E. Robertson, St. John, Mrs. J. E. O'Brien, Camarot, Montreal, and Mrs. W. McKnight, Montreal. She is also survived by the following brothers and sisters, Mr. V. H. Blackwell, G. A. Vye, Digby, St. John; Mrs. Annie Ooms, Cranham and Mrs. Rebecca McDonald New Glasgow. Claude Leighton Moore who gave his life in the late war was her eldest son, and she left his last yearly.

The funeral services which were conducted by Rev. E. A. King, assisted by W. J. Bate, were held in the Baptist Church on the arrival of the Ocean Liner from Montreal, Thursday afternoon. The funeral tributes were many and beautiful testifying to the high esteem in which she was held. The remains were laid to rest beside those of her husband in the family lot in the Miramichi Cemetery. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the sorrowing family.

### VETERAN DROWNS AT BURNT CHURCH

A sad drowning accident occurred at Burnt Church on Monday evening. Edmund Thurston, a veteran of the great war, went in the river bathing and was carried out to a deep water. An Indian boy who was near noticed Thurston was in difficulty, but the unfortunate young man was carried out by the current before he could be reached and was drowned. He was unmarried and about twenty-five years of age.

### HUSBAND LOSES IN RACE WITH DEATH

The reported fatal situation in the vicinity of Bathurst which has been under investigation all summer improved but slowly. There has been about 150 cases, mostly in West Bathurst, and of the number of patients, of ten per cent, have died. The latest deaths were those of Mrs. Edna L. Dunn, formerly Miss Edna O'Brien of Bathurst, aged twenty-four, and Joseph T. Daigle of West Bathurst, aged sixty-five. While Mrs. Dunn lay critically ill her husband, who was in Boston, N. H. home, but was too late to find his young wife alive.

### PRICE OF SUGAR MAY BE LOWER

Hope for a reduction in the price of sugar in this land by the early reports from the Cuban sugar plantations, which have started their summer harvest. In the Puerto Alegre district the first crop weighed 130,000,000 pounds and 5,500 tons of this was sold at the plantation for six and one-half cents a pound, a lower quotation than has been accepted for raw sugar for many months. The balance of the crop sold later at seven cents a pound. It is estimated that the value of the first crop for the entire country this year will be more than \$22,500,000 and the harvesters are looking forward to a profit of 2 1/2 to 3 per cent on their crop.

### PROVINCE DIVIDED FOR ENFORCEMENT OF PROHIBITION

Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson announced on Saturday the appointment of chief officers for four of five zones into which the province has been divided for the enforcement of the prohibition law. The division is as follows: Zone No. 1, St. John's; Zone No. 2, Miramichi; Zone No. 3, North Shore; Zone No. 4, West Shore. The division is in force as of August 17th.
