The Steamer Valetta left St. John's  
on Saturday for Montreal.

The Alhambra left New York on Fri-  
day for St. John's via Halifax.

The Brigantine 'Hector,' 198 tons,  
Captain Murchison, of Charlottetown,  
arrived here Tuesday last from St.  
John's to load ice for New York; she  
will take, we understand, all the ice,  
the enterprising purchaser, Mr Foley,  
of Charlottetown, can obtain here,  
which will be about 250 tons. We  
wish every success to the new adven-  
ture.

Information was received here last  
evening to the effect that a large steam-  
ship called the Flavinia had grounded  
on the northeast corner of Great Island  
(off Trout's Cove) and that her fore com-  
partment was full of water. It appears  
that this ship was bound from Liverpool  
to Montreal with a cargo of salt and pig  
iron. She had a good run out; but un-  
fortunately, during a dense fog on Fri-  
day night she met with this accident.  
The S. S. Kite and one of the tug-boats  
were sent to her assistance last night, and  
we understand that efforts are being made  
to get the ship off. — Telegram.
