### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The postmaster, Charlottetown, will be pleased to obtain the address of Mary J. Leonard.

SENIOR MARCONI and his assistants from the Wireless Telegraph Co., London, Eng., arrived in Sydney, C. B., on Thursday. The site for the station has been selected.

Eggs are more plentiful in the Boston market and prices have yielded since the first part of the month. Eggs of the best quality are now quoted at 20 and 25 cents.

The first letters from the Island boys who went to South Africa by the S. S. Manhattan were received last week. A stormy voyage is reported, and all the boys in good health.

A STREET register book has been placed at the police station. Anyone who has complaints to make regarding dangerous platforms, or other nuisances on the street, by making an entry on this book it will be looked after.

SIR WM. McDONALD, the millionaire tobaccoist of Montreal has presented McGill University with \$20,000 for the library. This amount will purchase 12,000 volumes, bringing the library up to over 100,000 volumes.

ANOTHER shipment of horses will be made by the British government from St. John to South Africa next month. A large steamer has been chartered for the purpose. There will be between 700 and 800 horses in the shipment.

COL. Sam Hughes, offers to raise 2,500 Canadians for service in South Africa on condition that he be in command and that he be not responsible to any British officer, except Kitchener or French or one who in his opinion is competent to appreciate and take advantage of Canadian troops.

FRIDAY afternoon a committee representing the cheese and butter makers of P. E. Island, called on Mr. Joseph Burgess, presenting him with an address and a beautiful meerschaum pipe to which he feelingly replied, expressing his regret at having to leave his old associates. Mr. Burgess leaves for Cowansville, Quebec, on or about the first of April.

MASTER Wendell Gordon of Montague, who had both his legs amputated below the knees, as the result of an accident in a saw mill, and who had recently been furnished with artificial limbs, had the great misfortune to fall from his seat in the school on Wednesday last and break one of his legs above the knee, besides receiving other injuries. The little fellow suffered great pain.

KISSING the Bible is no longer obligatory in Ontario courts. The legislature last week made a change so that the oath may be administered as in Scotland, by uplifted hand and repetition of the words: "I swear by Almighty God, as I shall answer to God at the great Day of Judgment, that I will tell the truth, so far as I know, and the same shall be asked of me."

WHEEL a steamer was driving a load past the north entrance of the Post Office a few days ago, the earth suddenly caved to behind him, leaving a hole about 12 feet deep and six feet in diameter. The hole, which was used as a cesspool many years ago had never been filled up, but had been planked over and covered with ashes, and the plank had rotted away. The wonder is that some one had not broken through before this. The cavity has been filled up.

FLOODS have been causing great damage in New Brunswick during the past week. By the breaking of the ice jam on the Nashua River, near Stanley, a wild rush of water was let loose, overflowing the banks for miles below. When the jam broke, Mrs. Alex. McPherson and her daughter were attempting to escape from their home near the river bank to the high ground and were caught in the raging torrent. Mrs. McPherson was rescued, but the daughter was drowned. Bridges have been washed away, roads raised, lumber and valuable property lost.

THE body of the late Dr. Robt. S. McDonald, of Cornwall was found on Friday morning frozen in the ice at Dockendorff's shore. White's Point, opposite Victoria Park, by Mr. Harry Dockendorff, Dr. McDonald disappeared last January, and it was supposed that he must have met his death while walking on the ice, as it was unsafe, at that time, as no trace could be found of him. He was the son of Mr. Allan McDonald, of Cornwall and was unmarried. He removed from Omaha, Neb., to Cornwall, a short time previous to his death.

AN Ottawa despatch says that the Cabinet at a meeting on Saturday had under consideration a despatch from the Imperial authorities inviting Canada to send a military contingent to the Coronation in June next. It was decided that the invitation be accepted, but that the exact number and the composition of the force will not be determined for a few days. The Minister of Militia is making inquiries with reference to the other Colonial contingents in order that Canada may make as good a showing as any other portion of the Empire. The force to cross the Atlantic on that occasion will consist of not less than 700 or 800 men.

CONSTABLE WINTERS and Superintendent Primrose of the Northwest Mounted Police arrived here a few days ago to select recruits. The applicants were required to be in height 5 ft. 8.; maximum weight, 175 lb.; chest measurement, 35 inches. Fifteen men were accepted as follows. They will be paid \$60. a day including clothes and board.

They left yesterday morning by the Minio en route to Regina. Constable Primrose will enlist additional men at Halifax. The men from this Province already serving in the Mounted Police have given great satisfaction and on this account the number taken this time was somewhat increased.

### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

THE market was very slily attended yesterday. Pork is still 8 c. per lb. Other prices have not changed.

The Newfoundland seal fishing is reported to be a failure this year. The S. S. Newfoundland arrived at St. John's N.B. on Monday with only 300 seals on board. A good average catch would be 25,000.

In the House of Commons on Monday Hon. Mr. Fielding stated that no special arrangements as to wireless telegraphy between P. E. Island and the mainland had been included in the contract with Marconi.

AN Ottawa despatch says: Provision is to be continued to the owners of creameries in Canada who will all get \$50 from the government if they provide, keep, and use a gold storage refrigerator room. All who have not received the bonus are entitled to \$50 the first year and \$25 a year for the next two years.

The Holy Week ceremonies commence at 7 o'clock this evening when Te Deum will be sung. The same office will be sung at the same hour on Thursday and Friday evenings. The morning office on Holy Thursday and Good Friday will commence at 8 o'clock and on Saturday at 7.30. At 3 o'clock on Good Friday afternoon the way of the Cross will be held.

DURING the storm on Monday morning last, two sealing vessels of 80 and 40 tons, were driven ashore at Fox River, about six miles from St. Peter's, on the north side of the Island. One of the vessels is from Newfoundland, the other from the Magdalen Islands. The matter was reported to the Marine Department and parties were sent to take charge of the vessels. The crews were landed safely, but one, if not both of the vessels, will be a total wreck.

AN Ottawa despatch of the 25th says: It is pretty certain that another Imperial contingent will shortly be raised in Canada. The next contingent will probably number 700 or 800 mounted men and will take the place of some of the men whose time of service will soon expire and make good the waste of previous contingents. The fourth contingent will, like the last two, be enlisted, outfitted and transported at the Imperial expense.

AN unknown man who was placed under arrest at Everett, Mass., for murdering a policeman has been identified by Detective Power, of Halifax, as George Hughes, of that city. Photographs of the murderer were received by Power from the chief of police of Everett. Hughes was recently released from the penitentiary. He was sentenced to twenty years for shooting a man in Lunenburg, N. S., but was released after having served 16 years. Hughes is 45 years old. His people reside in Halifax.

THE steamer Princess crossed from here to Pictou and returned on Thursday last. This is the earliest crossing on record for the steamers of the summer navigation of the straits. She also made round trips on Friday and Saturday. On Monday and Tuesday of this week, the Minio made return trips between here and Pictou. The steamer Stanley did not cross to Tormentine on Monday in consequence of the storm. Yesterday she started from Summerside, but returned without reaching Tormentine, the approach to the pier being reported blocked with ice.

THE solemn ceremonies of blessing the palms were carried out in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday last. His Lordship, the Bishop officiated, assisted by Rev. Father Johnston and Rev. Dr. Sinnott, as deacon and sub deacon and Rev. Dr. Monaghan as master of ceremonies. After the blessing and distributing the usual procession and ceremonies at the entrance of the church took place. After the return of the procession to the sanctuary, Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Dr. Monaghan assisted by the same deacon and subdeacon as in the blessing of the palms.

A DESPATCH from Beauharnois, Que., of the 19th inst., says: Mr. Loy, liberal, candidate for coronator by agents, and Mr. Bergeron, conservative, were nominated in the Beauharnois by-election for the house of commons today. Both were candidates in the last general election. Bergeron's chances are considered good. The liberals made a big attempt to shut Mr. Bergeron out of a committee room in Valleyfield, hiring all available space at considerable expense. Mr. Bergeron thereupon hired the steamer Valleyfield, wintering in the canal, and the novelty of the scheme has proven one of the greatest hits of the campaign. Steam has been gotten up and the boat's big whistle is used to summon electors to the meetings.

"MATRIMONY" was the subject of Rev. Dr. Morrison's sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday evening last. His text was from the fifth chapter of the Epistle of St. Paul to the Ephesians at 23rd and following verses. The Rev. preacher pointed out how our Lord had elevated marriage to the dignity of a sacrament. It was of this sacramental character of marriage that St. Paul spoke when he compared the union therein embraced as the union of Christ with His Church. If we would live according to the teachings of our Divine Lord we must always regard marriage as a sacrament. Therein consists its real and true greatness. Like all other sacraments three elements were embodied in it. The doctrine and practice of the Catholic Church regarding marriage have always been the same. In the earliest ages of the Church she taught, as she does today, that marriage is a sacrament. This was proved, among other ways, by the early sectaries who broke away from the Church. They continued to regard marriage as a sacrament. The marriage contract must be free, otherwise it is no marriage at all. In order that marriage should always be free, such impediments as might exist under certain circumstances should be removed. The marriage contract can only be broken by the death of the husband or wife. In order to be truly happy there should be union of tastes, of sentiment and of belief. Therefore mixed marriages should not be contracted. The chances in such cases were strong against the real happiness that would exist in the married state. We should, in regard to this sacrament, as well as all others, so conduct our lives that after our earthly pilgrimage we would enjoy the happiness of Heaven.
