INVENTS CHURN IN DREAM.

illis Pratt, an Indian Farmer, Has Profitable Vision of Mechanics.

Sullivan, Ind., Aug. 3-Willis Pratt a farmer living near Farmersburg, is today \$25,000 richer, owing to an inven-tion which he pictured in a dream. ome time ago Pratt dreamed three nights in succession about the contruc-tion of an improved churn. The con truction of it differed so radically from hurns now in use , that he set to work and modelled one after the one he pictured in his dreams.

As soon as the model was completed he obtained a patent and began manufacturing churns on a small scale at his home. Various patent journals published announcements, describing the invention in full. Last week a churn company of Chicago asked Pratt to place a price on his invention, which he did, putting the figure so high that he had little of the company accepting the price. 
