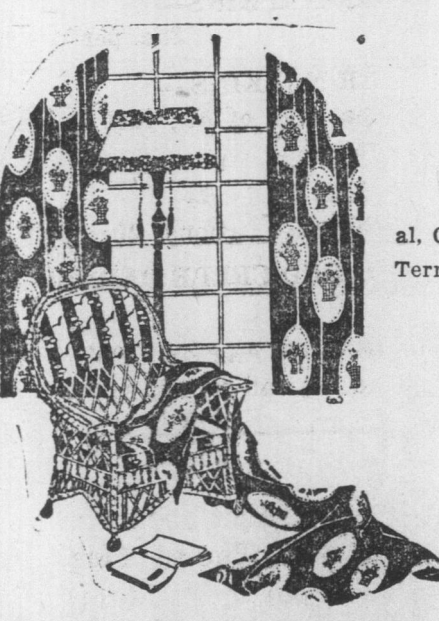

An Open Insult.

"Will the Hon. Alfred B. Morine
when kindly informing the public as
to whether the Prince, who is about
to be properly received, has sufficient
German blood in him to justify his
internment had he attempted to
(visit) Newfoundland while the war
was on?"—(Daily Star, Aug. 7th.)

For some considerable time past
the leading members of the present
Government have been subjected to
the most unwarranted exhibitions of
abuse and scurrility by the Opposi-
tion Press, their social standing and
business affairs have been misrep-
resented and dragged before, not alone
the public of St. John's, but the
world at large, to gratify the petty
spleen and malice of a few disappoint-
ed politicians and their hirelings,
who are utterly unable and unquali-
fied to discuss the affairs of the coun-
try in a gentlemanly and courteous
manner. If all our faults were writ-
ten upon our foreheads, very few of
us would occupy front pews in the
churches. Heaven knows the tone of
the Opposition Press was low and
degraded enough when confined to
our own public men, but when ad-
vantage is taken of by the Star news-
paper to hurl an open insult at His
Royal Highness the Prince of Wales,
our future King, the climax is reach-
ed, and the perpetrators should hang
in their heads in shame, if they posses-
sed the least semblance of that com-
modity. By insulting the Prince of
Wales, the Star has offered a double
insult to His Majesty the King, the
late King Edward the Peacemaker
and Victoria the Good. We have yet
to find in any newspaper published in
the English language in British pos-
sessions such an insult directed
against the patriotism of the reigning
House of Windsor. Even Bradlaugh
in his most virulent and obnoxious
charges against Royalty, in years
gone by, never stooped so low. Then
how can our public men such as Sir
M. P. Cashin and others hope to es-
cape the venom of such a modern
Terentius—that snarling and scur-
rulous fellow amongst the Greeks—
when the son of our King has his an-
cestors dragged up from their resting
places and subjected to cold-blooded
insult and uncalled-for insinuation.
Must the name of His Royal Highness,
who has come amongst us as the
representative of his father our
King, have his name dragged into
the cauldron of Newfoundland poli-
tics? His Royal Highness has come
amongst us to fortify himself with a
personal and practical knowledge of
our country and our people, which
will materially assist him in doing all
in his power to advance the interests
of Britain's Oldest Colony, when,
in the natural course of events, he
shall be called to rule over our vast
Empire. When a newspaper, which
one would suppose, was established
as a teacher of youth, prostitutes the
noble calling of the Press to descend
to such low, contemptible and dis-
loyal tactics to bolster up a lost
cause, what may we not expect from
those who have not had the advan-
tages of education, and whose loyalty
to the Throne may be shaken by such
remarks as those published in the
Star on the 7th inst? How disordered
must be the mind of a man who
would permit loyalty and respect for
our future Sovereign to become sub-
servient to the requirements of a
political campaign. The people of the
neighboring Provinces are vying
with each other to see who will do
the most to honor our future King
during his visit to their portion of his
Great Empire on this side of the At-
lantic. Instead of having assisted the
authorities, as loyal subjects should do
to give a hearty and suitable welcome
to the Prince of Wales, the Opposition
Press has done everything in its
power to hamper their efforts, with-
out having made the least attempt to
assist them by suggestions or other-
wise. It is the simplest thing in the
world to find fault with any great
affair that may be initiated or car-
ried out. The greatest curse to any
community are the critics and fault
finders, and when in the future the
members of the Opposition Press of
to-day peruse what they have written
in their back files they must be even
more depraved and disloyal than their
present conduct marks them out to be,
if they do not curse the day they were
carried away by jealousy and malice
to insult His Royal Highness during
his visit to our shores. Our con-
temporaries may be a star, but it is
unquestionably of the Sirius order—
judging from its snarling during one
of the most important epochs in our
history.
