Expert Newfoundland Telegrapher.

DIES WHILE AT WORK. (H. F. SHORTIS.)

William J. Carroll, regarded as one of the best telegraph operators in the United States, died at his key in the Bankers' Trust Company office, No. 18 Wall Street, New York, a few days ago. He had started sending a message to a Western correspondent when he was seized with a heart attack. He was about fifty-five years old. Mr. Carroll was in charge of the day wire of the old Laffan News Bureau before it was taken over by the United Press Association; later took charge of the cables at the Sun office, and for a time was night manager of the Herald-Sun Syndicate. About a year and a half ago he joined the operating staff of the Bankers' Trust Company. Will Carroll served his apprenticeship in the Anglo-American Telegraph office in St. John's—his native city—and it was easy to recognize that he would become a first-class operator. He joined the Anglo a short time after I left it. Of all the operators who worked with me in my young days in the Anglo-American Telegraph Company on the old West Line and elsewhere, and who emigrated to the United States and Canada, I can only think of one now alive. His name is Peter Clendenning. St. John's, who resides in Kansas, U.S.A., and retired some years ago. All the rest, such as E. F. Howell, Jack Mitchell, Mike and Jack Kavanagh, Batty Doubtney, Mart and Red Brien, Mat and Jim Scanlan (two rattling operators), A. A. Thompson, and others have passed away, and everyone of them was recognized as an expert operator and held positions of great responsibility. The following extract from a letter which I received from my friend P. S. Scanlan, son of the late T. D. Scanlan, who left Newfoundland about thirty-six years ago, will be perused with interest by the readers of the Telegram, more particularly by those mentioned therein:—

"When I came to New York in 1885, I found all the heavy circuits at bid 195 Broadway, covered by Newfoundlanders, Mac Thompson, Jack Sedgwick, Chris Fallon, all of Harbor Grace. Gie Ward, Will Carroll of St. John's and Charlie Pike of Carbonade. Thompson, Ward and now poor Carroll passed on. Pike is chief operator at 24 Walker Street in the Western Union. Fallon is holding a responsible position with the Western Union at Kansas City, Mo."
