

The Revolt in Cuba. The correspondence of the N. Y. Tribune telegraphed the following to that journal on the 10th.

The news from the interior grows more and more alarming for the Captain-General. So far from being suppressed, the insurrection which was long confined to the eastern end of island, around Bayamo, 400 miles from Havana, seems steadily spreading westward toward the Cuban metropolis. The startling intelligence reaches us that outbreaks have occurred almost simultaneously at Sancti Spiritu, more than half-way from Bayamo to Havana; at Cienfuegos on the southern coast, still nearer to Havana, and in direct communication with it; at Trinidad, another point on the southern coast only a little further the eastward, and at points between Vill Clara and Sagua la Grande, on the north coast and still nearer the Capital. More ominous still is the fact that difficulties have occurred between the citizens and the soldiers at a town so important and so near the Capital as Matanzas, on the North Coast, and that seizures of arms have occurred only nine leagues out of the city. All these are believed to come from the forces of Quesada, one of the principal associates of Cespedes. The Spaniards vainly followed him westward from Nuevas, and now suddenly find him planted on their lines of railroad, and threatening the important station of Villa Clara. The citizens of that place have been called out by the Spanish authorities and forced under arms to aid the regular troops. Quesada is known to have seven regiments under him, well armed. His great want is artillery. The rich planters are evidently encouraging him, for he has plenty of money. The island generally may be said to be in a state of undermined revolt, ready to flame out into a general insurrection at any moment. The Captain-General has only volunteer troops at hand.

Mr. Howe before the Electors.

Hon. Joseph Howe's address to the electors of Hants is published. He says he had three objects in view on presenting himself as a candidate at last election; to defeat the delegates who had framed the British American Act; to endeavour to get that Act repealed; and should failure be the result, to modify and improve it. He dwells on these topics. Referring to his acceptance of office, he says:—This office, men of Hants, though the technical formalities make it mine, is in your gift, and to be of any value to me, I must receive it at your hands. I could have accepted it with a seat in the Senate, and enjoyed it with your sanction; but you trusted me, and I am not afraid to trust you. On a calm review of the circumstances, I believe you will ratify by your suffrages my conduct and policy. A Mr. Goudge, of Windsor, N. S. has been pitched upon by the Repeal party as an opponent to the re-election of Mr. Howe. Meanwhile, Mr. Howe is preparing a pamphlet in his own defence, explaining the reasons that led to his recent action. He will endeavour to show them the uselessness of further opposition to the Confederation, and also that the existing interests of Nova Scotia lie rather in working cordially with the Union than in futile efforts to fly against the stream. Accounts differ as to the probable success of Mr. Howe in his appeal to his old friends in the county of Hants.

Lamentable Accident.

MRS. WM. LOGAN KILLED. We deeply regret to learn that the wife of Mr. Wm. Logan, York Road, was killed this (Saturday) morning while coming into town. It appears that the deceased in company with Mr. Logan started to come into town in a light wagon. When they got on to the York Road, it being raining a little, Mrs. Logan put up an umbrella, which it seems frightened the horse, which reared and kicked her in the temple. The horse also started off and ran against Mr. Fletcher's gate, a short distance off, when they were both thrown out. Mrs. Logan was at once taken up, and as she was bleeding freely from the kick inflicted, Mr. Fletcher's boy at once came in for Drs. Clarke and Tuck, who went out in all haste. The poor woman was, however, dead before they reached, and, on examining her, they gave it as their opinion, that in her fall over the dashboard of the wagon, her neck was dislocated, which was the cause of her death. She only survived a few moments after her fall, and was carried back a corpse to her house which she had only left a very short time before in perfect health. Mr. Logan, we believe, also received some injuries about the shoulder, but not of a serious character. She leaves behind her a young family of seven children, who are thus in a moment deprived of the tender care of their mother. The bereaved husband has the heartfelt sympathy of the community in his irreparable loss. Death has been busy in his household of late. It is not very long since he lost his two brothers within a week. Only a few weeks ago the late Robert Campbell died at his home, from the injuries he received from a threshing machine, and now his wife is cut off by a most melancholy accident.

WEALTH AND POVERTY IN ENGLAND.

England is the richest nation in the world, but she may be called the poorest also. She has the richest commerce and the richest church. Her commerce creates an interchange of products worth £450,000,000 sterling annually. Her church endowments approach £160,000,000 sterling in value, yielding a revenue of some £9,000,000 every year. Yet out of 20,000,000 of people, 1,000,000 are set down as paupers. One person in every twenty is a pauper. But this million is by no means the measure of the vast reaching mass of poverty that festers in her cities, towns, and villages, breeding pestilence and crime and burdening the industrious classes too unequally with heavy loads of taxation.
