DONERAIL, KENTUCKY COLT, WINS DERBY; BREAKS RECORD

Nips Ten Point at the Wire and Takes Honors of Thirty-ninth Renewal of Kentucky Derby, Time Was 2:04 4-5; Was in 100-to-1 Shot Class

SAID TO HAVE BEEN GREAT EXHIBITION OF RACING

At the Mile Ten Point Was Three Lengths Ahead, and Rode the Life out of Leader in Stretch, Taking Lead Just Before Wire Was Reached

Louisville, Ky., May 10.—A new champion horse year old of America leaped into prominence today, and the Churchill Downs Derby course record was broken before the great event that ever witnessed a Derby here, when Donerail, a Kentucky colt, nipped Ten Point at the wire and won the thirty-ninth renewal of the Kentucky Derby. The winner never having shown starting ability as a two-year-old, paid \$18,450 for \$2 in the pari-mutuel betting. The time was 2:04 4-5. The field was larger than had been predicted, eight starters facing the barrier, and spectators who have witnessed runnings of the Derby for years, increasing alike for its turf and its prominence and sentiment of Kentucky.

When the horses passed the grand stand after running a quarter of a mile of the mile and a quarter course Ten Point had been leading with the others bunching closely behind him. At the turn Jockey Buxton had allowed his mount to take a commanding lead, and at the mile Ten Point was three lengths ahead, with the others fighting hard and with about even chances. As they rounded the last turn Jockey Goodie began to force general out of the crowd he had been running with and started after the leader.

The Kentucky colt steadily wore down the favorite in the stretch, and the first named got up in the last few strides to win by a length. Go Well, a filly sired by Orville, was third, and Foundation finished out of the money.
