Death of George A. Marr

When it became known on Saturday morning last that Mr. Geo. A. Marr had died the night before in Chicago, there were many expressions of regret made by his old friends in Aylmer. Mr. Marr was born on the 1st of March of 1837, and was consequently in his 68th year at the time of his death. After receiving a fair education at what is known as the old Peacock school, he took a course at the Ann Arbor University, where he graduated with the degrees of Bachelor and Master of Science. He at once accepted a position with the U. S. Government and from that day to the day of his death was in the employ of that Government and had charge of many important engineering works on the Missouri and Mississippi rivers. For the past 18 years he has been superintendent of the Portage Lake Ship Canal with his headquarters at Houghton, Mich. During the past winter he spent a few weeks in Aylmer with his only daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Smith. At that time he was apparently in good health and thoroughly enjoyed the visit with his many old friends. In the latter part of Feb. he started with a party of about 100 on a special train for a pleasure trip through old Mexico, and on his arrival in the city of Mexico he felt so poorly that he went to the hospital and remained there until the return trip began. A trained nurse and two physicians accompanied him on the return trip and everything possible was done for him, but either the physicians did not realize how sick he was, or else they used very bad judgment, as no intimation was given to Dr. or Mrs. Smith that his illness was of a dangerous nature. Dr. Smith left on Thursday to meet the train on its arrival at Chicago and it was not until he boarded the train on Friday afternoon that he realized his dangerous condition. He wired at once for Mrs. Smith to come immediately and she lost no time, but did not arrive until Saturday morning, too late to see her father alive. Mr. Marr was taken to the hospital in Chicago and several of the best physicians in the city were summoned, but it was too late and he died a few hours later, from acute inflammation of the liver. The remains were brought to Aylmer and the funeral took place on Monday afternoon conducted by the Rev. R. W. Trotter, pastor of the Baptist church of which denomination deceased was a member for many years. No finer, better, truer or more honorable man ever lived than George A. Marr, and personally we feel it an honor to have been favored with his friendship. Senator Wheeler, of Detroit, a life long friend of deceased, who came here to pay his last respects to his friend on Monday, said to us: "Geo. was a busy, active man and his business brought him in contact with many men of all classes, but I never knew or heard of one, either his superior Government officer or the man working under him, who did not like him." No man could have that record who was not a good and true man.

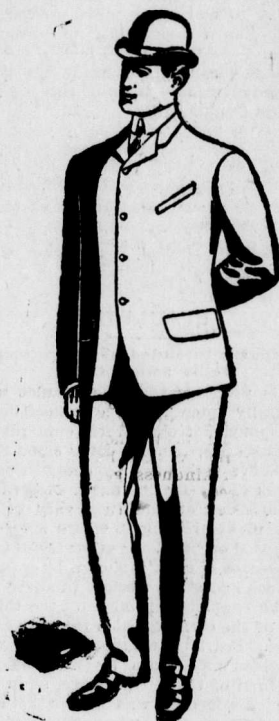
