COUNTY OF KENT. A Court of General Peace held at the Court House in the Town of Chatham in and for the said County on Tuesday the sixth day of January A. D. 1852.

Present William Benjamin Wells, Esquire, Chairman, Thomas McCune, Alexander R. Robertson, Archibald McKellar, John W. Keating, Robert Mitchell, John E. Delmage, and George Young, Esquires, her Majesty's Justices assigned, &c.

It was ordered, That the number, limits and extent of the Divisions for Division Court purposes in the County of Kent, shall on and after the 15th day of January, 1852, be as follows:

First Division, To consist of the Townships of Dover East and Dover West--Township of Chatham from 1st to 5th concessions inclusive to the line between Lots Nos. 18 and 19 in such concessions--Town of Chatham,--All that portion of the Township of Harwich West of the centre line of that Township commencing at the River Thames, and extending Eastwardly to the Ridge Road, Thence Westwardly on the North side of said road to the Government Road in Blenheim, Thence along the Government Road on the North side of the same to Cooks Corners, Thence Westwardly along the North side of the Middle Road to the line between Lots Nos. 12 and 13 in Raleigh, Thence along the Road allowance on said line to concession A. Thence along concession A. on the North side to the line between the 3rd and 4th concessions in Tilbury East, Thence West along said line to the limit of the County, Thence Northwardly along the County line to the River Thames.

Second Division, To consist of the Township of Oxford, the Southern part of the Township of Howard, from the line between the 8th and 9th concessions of Howard aforesaid, Thence S. along the Township line between Howard and Harwich to the line between the 5th and 6th concessions in Harwich, Thence along said line to the centre line of the Township of Harwich, Thence Westwardly and Northwardly to Cooks Corners, Thence Southwardly along the Township line between Harwich and Raleigh to Lake Erie including all of Harwich not contained in the First and Fourth Divisions respectively.

Third Division, To consist of the Townships of Camden and Zone, and all of the Township of Chatham not included in the First Division.

Fourth Division, To consist of all of the Townships of Howard and Harwich not included in the First and Second Divisions respectively.

Fifth Division, To consist of the Townships of Romney and all that part of the Townships of Tilbury East and Raleigh not included in the First Division.
