BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Statement o the Situation Toronto, Ont., Sept. 18 .- R. G. Dun

The Montreal Exhibition, though not so numerously attended as in some former years, has drawn in a fair number of visitors, who spend a certain amount of money, and both wholesalers and retailers have experienced some improvement in trade. Following the advance in grey cottons noted last week there has been a revision in the price of sheeting, which have been put up 1-2c all round, and letters from England would seem to anticipate an advance in prints. Sugars are about steady at last decline, with a rather better demand, owing to the large consumption of cheap fruit. Shoes are quiet; also local business in leather; but there is a good export movement in sole, buff and splits. Beef hides are advanced a cent, but tanners are slow to buy at the higher prices. Hardware and metal men do not report much improvement in the general demand, but import agents are booking orders for galvanized sheets, plates, etc., which dealers are anxious to have here before the close of navigation. The Engish cheese market has been cabled a shilling stronger within the week, and local values are half a cent better. Threshing is now general throughout the country, and the results quite bear out previous reports of a bountiful yield of grain. The money market is a shade easier, call funds being readily available at 4 1-2 per cent. General collections are still on the poor Business in wholesale circles at To-

ronto is not as active as that reported a week ago. Prices of the leading staples are firm. An advance of 5c to 7 1-2c in cotton goods has been decided upon by manufacturers, while no changes are reported in woolen fabrics. There is a further advance in hides, and the leather trade is helped thereby. The movement of grain is not very liberal as yet, but it will increase from this time out. There is practically nothing doing in barley, and the outlook is unfavorable as far as prices are concerned. Wheat markets are more encouraging, with advances in Britain and the United States. Exports are good, and would be larger if freight rates were less, and space more liberal. The money market is unchanged. Prime com mercial paper is discounted at 6 to 6 1-2 per cent and call loans are quoted at 5 to 5 1-2. Speculation on he Stock Exchange is quiet. The bulk of the business is for investment and prices generally are firm. The failures for the week are 32, as against 29 for the same week of last
