

On Carling's Heights

London and Guelph Field Batteries Go Under Canvas.

Preparations for the Jubilee Celebration Today.

Practicing the Maneuvers at Queen's Park.

Cost of the Camp—Pay of Officers and Privates.

Interesting News From the White City—Those Who Are Exempt From Military Service—Bugle Notes.

The volunteers in camp on the heights were yesterday afternoon augmented by the London Field Battery and the First Brigade of Artillery, composed of the Sixteenth and Eleventh Field Batteries. The Eleventh, or "A" Battery, is recruited from the township of Guelph. The Sixteenth, or "B" Battery, is from the city of Guelph, and contains 49 men from the Agricultural College. The artillery will be commanded by Lieut.-Col. Nivoll, of Guelph. His staff will be Major Davidson, Sixteenth Battery, and Capt. Murchison, Eleventh Battery. Brigade Surgeon Major James Lindsay, Quartermaster Thatcher and Capt. Reid, V.S.

The Sixth London Field Battery will be in command of Capt. Fairbank, of Petrolia, and under him will be Lieut. Dr. G. H. Wilson, Lieut. Johnston, Sergt.-Major Taylor, Veterinary C. S. Tumbler, Quartermaster W. Irvine, Sergt. Burwell, orderly Room Clerk Alderice, with Dr. Stitt as surgeon-major.

The sergeants in charge of the guns are: No. 1, Sergt. Black; No. 2, Barnhill; No. 3, Main; No. 4, J. Hyman. The Eleventh Battery will be in command of Lieut. Gilchrist and Osg. Surgeon-Major Snider and Quartermaster Doughty. Sergeants in command of the guns are: No. 1, McIntosh; No. 2, Gould; No. 3, Hyde; No. 4, Wilkinson.

The Sixteenth Brigade will be under Capt. Simpson and Lieut. Harrison and Curzon. Surgeon-Major Spence and Quartermaster Major James Lindsay, of the guns are: No. 1, McIntosh; No. 2, Anderson; No. 3, Armstrong; No. 4, Houlgate.

Col. Dray and Capt. Ogilvie of the Royal Military College, Kingston, will be the instructors, the latter acting as brigade major.

TODAY'S ORDERS.
The orders for today are as follows, Lieut.-Col. Smith commanding: Field officer, Brigadier-General Kenward, St. Clair Borderers; next for duty, Major Weir, Bruce battalion, Sanitary officer, Surgeon-Major Hayes, St. Clair Borderers; next for duty, Surgeon Major Martin, Bruce battalion.

The Middlesex Light Infantry will furnish the brigade guard and duty band, next for those duties, the St. Clair Borderers.

No. 1—The artillery, while in camp, will fire a gun at reveille, retreat and first post.

No. 2—Today usual parades will be dispensed with, and instead of them the corps in drill will be in the strong as possible in the "review" order, and form up on their private parades at 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., marching to the Queen's Park for the celebration of her Majesty's diamond jubilee.

No. 3—In accordance with general order of June 14 the artillery will fire a royal salute at 12 o'clock, noon, in honor of the diamond jubilee of her most gracious Majesty the Queen. The salute will be fired in Queen's Park.

No. 4—Second Lieutenant Fisher, of Middlesex Light Infantry, has been granted leave of absence for three days.

THE QUEEN'S PARK CELEBRATION.
Yesterday afternoon the whole force was marched down to Queen's Park, where a rehearsal took place. The movements of the troops were very grand sight. The march past will be in quarter-sections instead of by companies. Lieut.-Col. Smith will be in command, and Lieut. Widgey, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto, will be master of ceremonies in the ring.

THE COST OF CAMP.
The cost of the camp per day is considerable. Yesterday's ration for 1,200 men and horses (not including the artillery there are nearly 400 horses, and the expense attached to the keep of them at once presents itself as a big thing. Every private

and non-commissioned officer in the Thirty-second and Twenty-seventh, gets, in addition to his pay, a bonus of 25 cents from the county he represents.

Staff—Deputy adjutant-general, \$7 30; assistant adjutant-general, or quartermaster-general, \$6 00; brigade major, \$5 15; staff captain, \$3 77; staff lieutenant, \$3 05; staff paymaster, \$5 47; camp quartermaster, \$3 77; supply officer, with a force of not less than 1,000 strong, \$5; and over 500 strong, \$3 90; surgeon-major, \$4 80.

Lieut.—Lieut.-col., \$4 87; major, \$3 90; paymaster, \$5 05; adjutant, with rank of captain, \$2 82; adjutant, with rank of lieutenant, \$2 44; quartermaster, \$2 82; surgeon, \$3 65; assistant surgeon, \$2 43; veterinary surgeon, \$2 50; captain, \$2 82; lieutenant, \$1 58; second lieutenant, \$1 28.

LIVE TO FIGHT ANOTHER DAY.
In time of trouble there are a few persons between the ages of 18 and 60 years who are exempt from enrollment for actual service. These are judges of all the courts of justice in the Dominion, the clergy and ministers of all religious denominations, teachers in religious orders and professors in every college and university, all officers regularly employed in the collection and management of the revenue; the garden and all officers and servants employed permanently in penitentiaries, and officers, keepers and guards of public lunatic asylums; persons disabled by bodily infirmity; the only son of a widow, being her only support.

School masters in common and public schools are only called upon in cases of invasion or insurrection.

\$5,000, with several parts to finish them.

Mr. Shields explained that Messrs. Moved by Mr. Abell, seconded by Mr. Burgess, that the building committee be instructed to go to the town architect, Mr. Fawcett, and get plans drawn up to suit them.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Shields, seconded by Mr. Kelly, that the chairman or secretary of the board correspond with the various architects, and state the case and inviting fresh tenders.

The amendment carried.

After this important business was settled a good deal of discussion followed on Mr. Kelly's suggestion that an annual holiday, with sports, etc., for the school children, be arranged by the board, as is done in many other places. Finally the chairman and Mr. Kelly were appointed a committee to confer with the teachers on the matter and report at next meeting to the board.

It was then decided that all teachers be paid their salaries to the end of July, and that the chairman and secretary were authorized to do so. The board then adjourned.

THE AYLMER RACES.

Second race—2:28 trot, with seven starters.

Third race—2:20 pace, 2:17 trot; six starters. This should be a programme to suit anyone. Most of the horses are here now, and they include the cream of horses in Canada and the bordering states. There is no doubt some great time will be made.

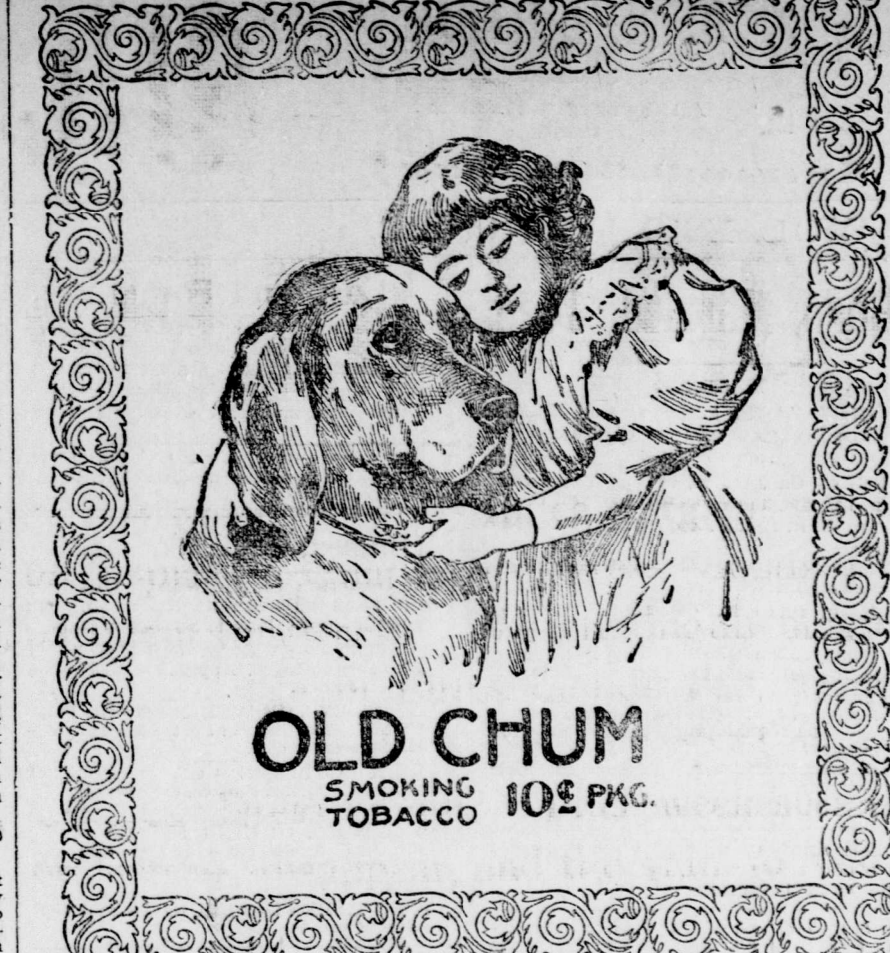
