PICKELL IS A BIGAMIST

A Verdict of "Guilty" Quickly Reached by the Jury.

The Prisoner Confronted by His Two Wives and Failed to Produce Evidence of a Divorce—Hints of Assassins.

Wednesday Afternoon.

THE BIGAMY CASE.

At 4:20 the trial of Jordan Pickell, charged with bigamy, began. Pickell, the big railroad man on the London street railway, who acted as president of Division 57 of the Employees' Association at the time of the first strike, and for some months afterwards. His face, as he appeared in the dock, was placid, though not infrequently lighted up with a bland smile as he caught the eye of some acquaintance in the densely packed court room. Wife No. 1, often cast tender glances in the prisoner's direction, but wife No. 2, for the most part kept her eyes averted. Pickell's complaisance was strongly contrasted with the expression on the face of his fellow-prisoner, George Harding.

The jurors sworn were: Michael Baines, Caradoc; Thos. McKenzie and E. J. F. Henderson, Adelaide; Henry Hayman, London; Emmie Hodgins, Biddulph; John Hyslop, London; C. Brodie, Caradoc; John Irvine, Lobo; Wm. Noble, McGillivray; Henry Blaine, Moss; Simon Peacock, Delaware, and Henry Harding.

E. F. B. Johnston, Q.C., was the prosecuting attorney, and Mr. E. T. Essery appeared for the prisoner.

WIFE NUMBER ONE.

Mrs. Esther Pickell was the first witness. Her maiden name was Esther Wilson. She testified that she was in Burford township, Brant county, when she was married to the prisoner, Nov. 23, 1881, by Rev. Mr. Law, a Baptist minister. From Burford township the young couple came to London. They went to Detroit 12 years ago, and the witness had been living there ever since. They had two children, aged 16 and 14 years, respectively. She and Mr. Pickell left for London, Ontario, in 1898, when he came to London. The prisoner came to where the witness was living on Eighteenth street, Detroit, in September, 1898, and talked to her at the door ten or fifteen minutes. He came for some books; witness did not know what books. She told him he could have nothing out of the house. He did not go inside the door. Mrs. Essery—Did you see him when he came to London to have him arrested last July? Before he left her, she said, he had tried several times to have her put in the Wayne county asylum.

Mr. Essery—How did you come to part?

Mrs. Pickell—He said if the doctors could not prove me insane, he would not live with me.

Mrs. Pickell said she was away from home nine days in March, 1898. A lady friend took her away to prevent her from being put in the asylum. She had been in the asylum twice before, from Sept. 25 to Dec. 7, 1896, and from July 28 to Oct. 9, 1897.

Mr. Essery—Did you take proceedings to obtain a divorce?

Mrs. Pickell—Papers were drawn up. Witness identified the application, which alleged "extreme cruelty and misconduct," on the part of Pickell, as grounds for the divorce. Pickell, she said, was then a motorman on the Detroit Street Railway, earning \$12 a week. At the time witness applied for the divorce, Pickell was trying to have her put in the asylum. No divorce was granted. Her object was to prevent her husband from accomplishing his purpose, and in this she was successful.

The divorce proceedings were dropped. Witness was questioned as to the domestic happiness of the Pickell home. Mr. Essery—He says that you were in the habit of throwing chairs at him, also the stove iron, cups of tea, plates, etc.

Mrs. Pickell smiled, and denied hav-

ing ever thrown anything at her husband. She was asked about her part in the bigamy proceedings. Detective Hays came to her house and asked her to come to London to give evidence against Pickell. Her railway fare was paid, she did not know by whom. Likewise her expenses at the hotel. The proceedings were started by the witness through a letter written to the clerk here. The letter had been written by a lady saying she knew the home of the witness to sell soap. She was a stranger, but Mrs. Pickell spoke to her of her husband being away, and the writing of the letter was thus suggested.

Rev. Mr. McEwen, of Toronto, superintendent of Baptist missions in Canada, identified the Rev. Mr. Law, referred to as having married Pickell and wife No. 1, as a regularly ordained minister of the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Ida Chambers, of Detroit, was for years the next-door neighbor of the Pickells in Detroit. She once saw Pickell strike his wife. She knew there was trouble in the family, but never knew of Mrs. Pickell having thrown anything at her husband.

Mr. J. H. Hays, Presbyterian minister of Arkona, gave evidence of having married Jordan Pickell and Miss Annie Smith on March 29 last. Before the ceremony Pickell said he had been married, but that he was a widower. He said nothing about a divorce.

Wife No. 2, who was Miss Annie Smith, the daughter of a Bosanquet farmer, is much younger in appearance than wife No. 1. She met Pickell in London at the house of a mutual friend about seven months before the marriage ceremony took place. They were engaged about three months.

The prisoner, Jordan Pickell, was examined. He said he left his first wife because she threatened to kill him. "She wouldn't cook, nor do the washing," he said, "and was always striking me with the stove iron. She had also cut her neighbor's clothesline and interfered with the water service. She had been away from him twelve or fifteen days, when he was served with notice of the divorce proceedings and attended court. He had paid his own lawyer, her lawyer and the costs of the court, and had been all right now." On the strength of that he believed the divorce had been granted.

The court adjourned shortly after 6 o'clock. Wife No. 2 fondly kissed the prisoner before he left the dock.

Thursday Morning.

The trial of Jordan Pickell was resumed sharp at 9 o'clock. The evidence all being in, Mr. E. T. Essery began his address to the jury for the accused. The learned counsel throughout his address hinted darkly at the influence of a third party in the prosecution. Mrs. Esther Pickell was out a figurehead. She had not acted in the matter of her own accord. It was the hand of "an assassin" that persecuted the prisoner. "They talk about boycotting," said Mr. Essery, turning toward the prisoner in the dock, "but God help the man that is to be boycotted in a box like that."

He attributed Pickell's connection with the street railway strikers as the cause of his prosecution.

Mr. Johnston carefully reviewed the case for the crown. This was not a fight between the street railway company on the one side, and the prisoner at the bar on the other, as the counsel for the prisoner had intimated.
