Negotiations Not in Order

Uncle Sam's Reply to Li Hung Chang.

Will Not Negotiate With a Government That Cannot Control Its Own Army and Citizens-Pekin Fully in the Hands of the Allies-Russia to Have 375,000 Men in the Far East.

REPLY TO LI.

Washington, Aug. 22.-The state department made public the following statement today: "The acting secretary of state authorizes the statement that a reply has been made today to Minister Wu's communication of two telegrams from Earl Li Hung Chang, dated respectively the 19th and 21st inst., relative to the cessation of hostile demonstrations and the appointment of representatives to negotiate with China." The reply of the United States Government to Li Hung Chang, says, in brief, that the government cannot enter upon negotiations until there is a government in China which can prevent the hostilities of Chinese troops and Chinese forces against the forces of the powers. The text of the reply has been communicated to the other governments.

IN THE ALLIES' HANDS.

London, Thursday, Aug. 20-4 a.m.-Today 1,500 Americans attacked the imperial palace, says a dispatch to the morning Post from Pekin, dated Aug. 15, and captured four of the courts. The American flag is flying over the imperial granary and the imperial bank has been looted. Describing events prior to the entry, the Morning Post correspondent cables: "On Aug. 12, the Tsung Li Yamen requested a conference with a view to peace. No armistice was granted, however, and that night we endured the longest fusillade of the whole siege. It lasted twelve hours. On Aug. 13 the Tsung Li Yamen begged to be excused from any conference, saying that the members were too busy. Later they wrote that they had forbidden firing on us, and would court-martial any who disobeyed. During the evening many shells fell in the legation compound."

CHILDREN ELOPED

Kalamazoo Youngsters Ran Away to Cincinnati.

Now the Girl Has Disappeared Again and Cannot Be Found.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 23.-Guy Brundage, a lad of 17, and Dot Cressor, a pretty girl a few months his junior, both members of highly respectable families here, disappeared from Kalamazoo several days ago, together, it is believed. Last Monday the couple turned up in Cincinnati, where the girl reported to the police in a distressed frame of mind, expressing the fear that Brundage would not marry her, as she was in a delicate condition. O. W. Jones, father of the boy, went to Cincinnati, and on Tuesday night had a long talk with the runaway couple at the hotel there. A short time afterward the girl mysteriously slipped out of the hotel, and no trace of her can be obtained, though persistent search for her has been made by the police, and fears are expressed for her safety. The runaway girl is a sister of Miss Jennie Cressor, who has acquired no small amount of notoriety in the last two years by marrying, at the age of 17, John W. Jones, a wealthy farmer of 80 years. Recently she was divorced from Jones, and has since several weeks in Kalamazoo and Van Buren county courts.

Running and Fighting

The Boers Indulge in Both Exercises

And the Casualty List in the South African Campaign Grows Longer.

London, Aug. 23.-Lord Roberts reports to the war office, under date of Pretoria, Aug. 22, as follows: "Buller's division marched to Van Wyksvlei, 15 miles south of Belfast, yesterday. His casualties were twenty. "Paget reports from Hammanskraal that Baden-Powell engaged Grobler's rear guard all day yesterday. Grobler was driven back east of Pinaar's River. Baden-Powell occupied the railway station of that name. During the fight Baden-Powell's advance and that of the enemy galloped into each other, the Rhodesians losing Col. Spreckley, and four men killed and seven wounded. Many of the Boers were killed or wounded. They were at Cyterkull this morning. Plumer and Hickman were closely pursuing them. "It seems certain that Dewet, finding it hopeless to make his way eastward, has re-crossed the Magaliesberg with a few wounded, with the intention of returning to the Orange River Colony. He is in a very different condition from that when he left Bethlehem with six or eight guns and 2,000 men. His guns have mostly been buried and his personal following cannot be more than 300. "It is stated that Steyn, with a small body of guards, has crossed Pinaar's River, on his way to join Kruger at Machadodorp. "The Boers yesterday blew up a portion of the railway at Koezies Drift, five miles north of Newcastle, and damaged the rails at a point 80 miles south of Newcastle."

NOBLE'S RECORD

Death of a Mormon Who Had Six Wives and 47 Children.

Chicago, Aug. 23.-A special to the Chronicle from Salt Lake City says: Joseph B. Noble, father of the first polygamous child born after that tenet was introduced into the Mormon Church, was buried at Bountiful, Utah. The funeral service was attended by 30 of his children, 84 of his grandchildren and a number of his great-grandchildren. Mr. Noble had six wives, 47 children, of whom 33 are living, and 124 grandchildren. He was a Massachusetts shoemaker, when Brigham Young went to his native town in 1832, and converted him among several.
