

Londoners Furious at His Claim from growing worse. That He Is Christ.

Ready to Tear Him in Pieces-Curious Study of Sociology.

London, Sept. 22.-The public excitement in London over the fanatic Pigott, who styles himself the Mes-siah, furnishes a curious study in sociology. The mere mention of his name is sufficient for the assemblage

of many thousands, all anxious to do bodily harm to the impostor. It is a strange commentary on the supposed phlegmatacising of the metroplis that it is necessary to assemble several hundred policemen for his protection whenever it is known that this pastor of a small parish is going from his house to the church to

conduct a service. The offender has done nothing except to announce the other day to members of his little sect that he was the reincarnated Christ. He made no fuss about it. He did not manifest the least desire for temporal power or even recognition outside his own small circle of followers. But his declaration got into the papers and forthwith passion seized many thousands Londoners to tear him to pieces.

The other night a coachman stopped in front of the North London station and remarked jokingly to a bystander that he was waiting for Pigott. The rumor spread like magic, and within a few minutes the crowd grew to a mob of many thousands. The police two hours before they succeeded in controlling the mob. The cry was constantly raised "Here he comes," "Down with the impostor; let's get at
