

SOO BILL LOST

The Government Had Three Votes to the Good.

OPPOSITION CHALLENGES VOTES

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Ont., April 21. - The longdrawn-out Soo bill debate was ended tonight and a division taken, but the issue is not yet decided. The division was on the amendment that the bill be given a six months' hoist, and it resulted in a majority of 3 for the Government. The vote on the bill itself was not taken, on account of the objection raised by Mr. Whitney in connection with the right of Hon. Mr. Stratton and Messrs. Conmee and Bowman to vote on the bill. Mr. Stratton is vice-president of the Traders' industries, and at the morning session tomorrow the argument will be as to whether their cases will be taken up individually or collectively. If the former course is taken, they will have to refrain from voting on the point of order, but if the latter, two may vote on each point of order only, the member affected abstaining. this question is decided, division on

Niedermeier, Marx and Van Dine Hanged at Chicago.

First Named Carried to Scaffold Strapped and Handcuffed.

Between Them Confesses to the Murder of Eight Person:-Story of Their Crimes.

Chicago, April 22. - Peter Neidermeier, Gustave Marx and Harvey Van Dine, the notorious car-barn bandits. and confessed murderers of eight men,

were hanged here today. Neidermeier was the first to die and his manner of death was unusual. He was so weak as the result of his recent attempt at suicide that the jail guards were forced to carry him to the scaffold. He was then placed in a chair and the drop sprung at 10:36. His body moved convulsively as he hung. Although it was first believed by the physicians that he was strangled, it developed that his neck had been broken. Twenty minutes after the drop fell, he was pronounced dead and the body was cut down.

Previous to the execution Neidermeier maintained the same sullen demeanor that had characterized him since he became a prisoner. While the death warrant was being read he snatched the document from the sheriff and stuck it in his pocket, making a sarcastic reference to his execution. He was truck, then carried down a flight of

stairs to the scaffold. Marx, accompanied by two priests, was led to the scaffold, repeating a litany after the clergy. He made no statement. He appeared weak, but met death bravely, the trap being sprung on him at 11:17. He was pronounced dead at 11:34, his neck having been

Van Dine was hanged at 11:55 a.m. Harvey Van Dine was hanged a short time after the execution of his companion, Marx.
