Board of Education Discuss Proposed Kindergarten at Chesley Avenue School.

Last night's session of the board of education did not last an hour. COMMITTEE REPORTS.

No. 1 committee's report recommended that eight globes and two dictionaries, to cost about \$124, be purchased for the public schools. The name of James Kirkwood was added to the substitute list of teachers. The board's printing was recommended to be awarded to C. P. Heal & Co. On account of Trustee McLear's potice of count of Trustee McLean's notice of motion to put the Typographical Union label on the board's printing, progress was reported on the letter upon the subject from local union, No. 133. Progress was also reported on Trus-tee Gillean's motion re kindergartens. Accounts totaling \$102 were recommend-

ed for payment. The report passed without amendment. No. 2 committee reported that Janitor Drewe had been placed in charge of the furnaces at the Collegiate Institute, Janitor Jury being transferred to St. George's school. ### THE MINE DISASTER AT DAYTON, TENN.

Total Number of Dead Will Reach Sixteen-List of the Killed.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 2.-The total of killed in the explosion in the Nelson mine, at Dayton, Tenn., will reach but 16. Thirteen bodies have been recovered and three more are known to be in the mine. It was discovered yesterday that the mine is on fire. The rescuing party distinctly felt the heat and were beaten back in their attempts to reach and recover the three remaining bodies in the mine. A revised list of killed follows:

### TORONTO PAINTERS GETTING TO WORK

Men Talk of Starting a Co-Operative Business-'Longshoremen on Strike.

Toronto, April 2 .- The failure of the offering to pay the men more than the rate demanded by the union, to complete work left unfinished when the lockout occurred. In three cases application was made, one for 15, another for 16, and a third for 9 men. A number of requests for men also were made by individual property owners. One employer, who is independent of the Master Painters' Association, agreed, according to the men, to comply with the requests of the union, and his men were allowed to go back to work.

'LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE. Halifax, N. S., April 1 .- The Longshoremen's Union decided to go on strike at midnight. Over 600 men will be affected. They now receive twenty cents an hour. They demand twentyfive cents an hour for day work, thirty cents for night work, and fifty cents an hour for Sundays and holidays. The steamship agents have refused to accede to the demand. Today the agency of the Furness-Withby Steamship Company locked out the 150 union men in their employ. They engaged 40 nonunion men to remove the cargo from the steamer Dalton Hall. When the order was issued the men employed on the steamers all stopped work.

C. P. R. TRACKMEN. Montreal, March 31 .- A deputation, consisting of about ten of the Brotherhood of the C. P. R. Trackmen were in conference today with Mr. D. McNicoll, second vice-president and general manager, and with Mr. C. W. Spencer, general superintendent of the C. P. R., regarding the new schedule, the men by Mr. McNicoll. THE OTTAWA PAPER-HANGERS Ottawa, Ont., April 2.—Some of the master painters have advertised for paper-hangers at \$2 25 a day, the rate demanded by the union men who are out on strike. The union men say they cannot answer the advertisement because the masters will not recognize the union. The masters, who are affected by the strike, say all the union men cannot earn the scale demanded.

#### The Width of a River.

It is necessary to make use only of the eyes and the brim of a hat to measure the width of any ordinary stream, or even of a good-sized river, and here is the way to do it: Select a part of the river bank where the grounds run back level, and, standing at the water's edge, fix your eyes on the opposite bank. Now, me your hat down over your brow until the edge of the brim is exactly on a line with the water line on the other side. This will give you a visual angle that may be used on any level surface, and if, as has been suggested, the ground on your side of the river be flat, you may "lay off" a corresponding distance on it. To do this you have only to hold your head perfectly steady, after getting the angle with your hat brim, supporting your chin with your hand, if necessary, and turn slowly around until your back is to-ward the river. 
