THE PAPAL MUSIC EDICT

Reform Commission Asks That the Rules Be Modified.

Rome, March 9.—The pontifical commission, which was formed here at the express wish of Pius X. to carry out the work of reform in church music, has just submitted to the Pope a request to exempt from some of the rules contained in the papal decree issued last year several countries throughout the world, among them the United States.

The principal provision of the papal decree against which many objections were raised at the time it was issued in many parts of the world is that excluding women from church choirs. The commission has just found that such a measure is impracticable in many countries, and if carried out would cause much hardship.

Among the countries besides the United States in which a reform on this point is impossible are Switzerland and Germany, in whose churches the bishops thus far have not made even the smallest effort to carry out the sweeping publications of the papal decree.

As to the United States it is well known here that, although spasmodic efforts have been made here and there to exclude women from church choirs by several bishops carrying favor with the curia, the majority of American bishops are entirely opposed to the general adoption of the papal decree, not only because it would be impossible to find men singers in many smaller parishes, but especially for the reason that the exclusion of women singers and the adoption of the Gregorian chant would tend to render church functions less attractive to the general public, and therefore greatly diminish the income of the church from the ordinary collections.

The commission now is convinced of the impossibility of excluding women from the choirs in the countries mentioned, and has suggested that the Pope issue a special decree making the adoption of the proposed reforms less imperative, leaving the matter to the judgment of the bishops in each diocese.

It is the firm conviction of everyone here that Pius X. will consent at least to modify the original decree. Since it has been issued the propaganda and the Vatican have received thousands of protests sent by bishops throughout the world.

A great sensation was caused at the Vatican when process servers asked to be admitted to serve papers on the cardinal secretary of state and other officials. The Swiss guards, in obedience to instructions previously received, refused them admission and closed the gates in their faces.

The process servers were the envoys of the local courts before which Count Falconieri, well known among the Roman nobility, has brought suit for more than \$80,000 which he claims he lent personally to the late Pope at a time when the Vatican was in financial difficulties.

Vatican officials deny the count's allegations. As it was not possible to bring the action against the person of the Pope, the count brought suit against the officials of the papal administration.

It will be difficult, however, to serve the papers in the suit upon the prelates of the Vatican, as the papal residence is exempt from Government jurisdiction. It is thought the threatened action will be compromised.

A large number of Maltese priests recently made application to the propaganda to be allowed to emigrate to the Philippine Islands to undertake church work under the jurisdiction of the new apostolic delegate, Mgr. Agius, who also is a native of Malta.

Many Maltese Roman Catholics who will emigrate to the island, and direct service between the island of Malta and Manila is to be established shortly by a Spanish company.

A recently printed article in a Manila paper, the Philippines, forming the first expedition, which will be followed as necessity requires by others.

LONDON MAY HAVE A STRIKE

Proposal to Reduce Wages of the Underground Road Employees

London, March 9.—The managers of the London underground railways have issued a circular to the employees, giving the proposed scale of pay which will be in force when the electrification of the roads now in progress shall be completed. The new scale will entail a reduction of wages.

For a week of six days of ten hours each, the proposed wages are: Motormen, \$8 75 to \$10 65; conductors, \$6 25 to \$7 50; gatemen, \$5 25 to \$5 65. The men work a nine-hour day and higher wages. A strike is possible.

NOW IT'S THE FISH TRUST

New Concern Attempts to Break Up a Big Combine.

Detroit, March 8.—The Wolverine Fish Company, of this city, has secured the backing of the State of Michigan in its fight against the fish trust. A bill has been filed with the state supreme court to have the trust dissolved. The bill shows up the trust as an illegal combination among the companies in the so-called trust are: D. McLeod, of Southampton, Ont.; Noble Bros., of Killarney, Ont.; Norrish Fish Company, of Norman, Ont.; Reid and Tait Fish Company; Transfer and Cold Storage Company; Seiger Bros., of Manitoba; Fish Company, of Selkirk, Man.; Georgian Bay Fish Company, of Collingwood, and the Buffalo Fish Company, of Goderich, Ont. The combine practically controls the fresh fish trade of the United States and Canada. It is capitalized at \$5,000,000, and sells 100,000,000 pounds of fish annually. The headquarters are in Chicago. The average profits are \$1,000,000 a year. An independent company, the Wolverine Fish Company, here, started here. The trust tried every way to put the Wolverine out of business. Now the Wolverine will endeavor to break up the combine.

PROFESSORS AT THE FRONT

Japanese Have Them to Interpret International Law.

New Haven, Conn., March 9.—Baron Kaneko, of Tokio, who has been in the United States for several months on a mission created for him by the Mikado's Government, delivered an address on the present war before the students of Yale last night. He said among other things that Japan is fighting the war according to the rules of civilized warfare, and is trying to follow international law. Two professors of international law are with each army corps, and two with each division. This far, he said, he has seen no violation of the rules of international law. On the other hand, Baron Kaneko said, Russia repeatedly offered to negotiate with Japan, and has not been fair.

WESTERN FAIR DATES

Annual Meeting and Election of the Association at Watford.

Watford, Ont., March 8.—The annual meeting of the Western Districts Fair Association held here today. The president was absent and Mr. J. Ferguson, of the West Middlesex Union Agricultural Society, acted as president. Delegates were in attendance from Stratford, Brigidon, Petrolia, Sarnia, and Watford. Mr. Albert Duncan, of Petrolia, submitted the treasurer's report showing a balance on hand of \$137. On voting, the funds were left in the hands of the treasurer to the credit of the association.

All the old officers were re-elected as follows: President, John Farrell, Forest; vice-president, J. Walker; Glencoe; secretary, G. C. Henderson, Sarnia; treasurer, Dan Petrolia. The delegates expressed themselves as being well pleased with the results attained since the organization of the association, and they agreed to extend the work to include a larger area. Co-operation along the lines outlined had proven most successful, and there was room for still further progress.

The following dates for fall fairs were adopted: Stratford, Sept. 18, 19; Petrolia, Sept. 24, 25; Sarnia, Sept. 25, 26, 27; Glencoe, Sept. 26, 27; Watford, Sept. 28, 29; Brigidon, Oct. 3; Alvinston, Oct. 3, 4; Forest, Oct. 5, 6. The secretary was instructed to communicate with the department and secure a staff of expert judges for the different fairs, as desired by the respective societies.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the president.
