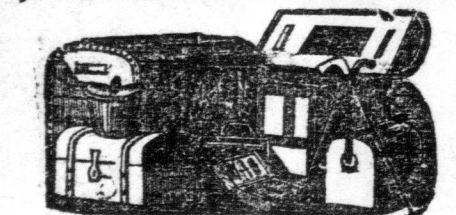

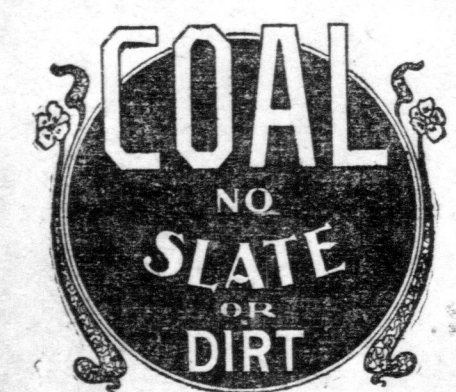

Her rare singing qualities proved a surprise to very many of her friends, for though they had heard her occasionally they were not aware of the great improvement in her voice, with careful training has brought about, since she determined to try her fortune on the stage.
