The rat is very prolific, and breeds three or four times a year, when well fed, producing from six to seventeen young ones in a litter. Poorly fed rats are less prolific,

producing fewer at a litter and breed. ing less frequently. He says that the best method of fighting the little animals is by trapping and by the construction of ratproof buildings. Considerable advices is given in the bulletin about the use of cement and wire netting in ratproofing buildings, and it is shown that although atention to this detail makes construction a little more expensive it more than pays for itself
