population down at 50, I do not believe there are over 50 there.

No Money for Census.

"In another hotel, where they were nearer the mark, I must say, they put the number down at 35, when there were only 25 people in the house. Consequently, I do not think the census is reliable. As to taking a census, I see no occasion for that. There is nothing in the appropriation for this purpose. The assessors will take the census next year, and then we will know whether or not we have 50,000. I do not think the Premier will declare the city has a population of 50,000 without a census. I am confident that the city's population is smaller than it is given out to be. The taking of a census will do the city no good. I see no occasion for the taking of it."

Ald. Cooper Favors It.

Ald. Cooper vigorously supported the resolution. He was confident that the city had a population, not of 50,000, but of 51,000.

WALKED OFF WHARF.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 23. — The mysterious disappearance of Edward Chase, of this city, on Oct. 9, was partially cleared up today when his body was found by an Indian floating in the St. John River, several miles below the city. When last seen Chase was walking towards one of the steamboat wharves and he apparently walked over the wharf and was drowned. He was 45 years of age, was married, and had a wife and four children. Coroner McEwan is considering the advisability of an inquest. There are suggestions in some quarters of foul play.

SCARLET FEVER

GAINING GROUND

Twenty Cases Have Been Officially Reported in London.

Scarlet fever, which has been steadily gaining ground in the city, and up to noon no less than 20 cases have been officially reported. In the last three weeks the number of scarlet fever patients in the city has increased from 10 to 20. So far the disease is practically confined to small children, although there are one or two older people who have contracted it. Diphtheria is gradually disappearing, and there are now only four patients in the contagious wards at Victoria Hospital, as against seven last week. The uncertain weather of the last week has been the cause of considerable sickness, and several cases of pneumonia have developed. Still many citizens are confined to their homes by reason of having contracted very heavy colds.

KING EDWARD AS FIREMAN.

The King's reference in his speech to the London fire brigade to the fact that he was once an amateur fireman, recalls an almost forgotten phase of his majesty's career. These were the days when the fire brigade was still to all intents and purposes a voluntary association, and when every man of pluck and public spirit thought it his duty to lend a hand. Among the most enthusiastic of these volunteers was the late Duke of Sutherland, who gathered round him a number of young men of high rank, including the heir to the throne. These young men were instructed in the arts of the fireman by Mr. Merryweather, the prince, as he admitted, liking nothing better than to take his part in a fire drill, and they all did splendid work—Dundee Advertiser.

AS THE WHALERS VIEW IT.

The faction which is endeavoring to discredit Dr. Cook's achievement falls back on his lack of elaborate equipment for a long Arctic sledge journey. This will make the Arctic whaler smile when they read how Capt. George Fred Tilton walked 2,000 miles from Point Barrow to civilization with little equipment beyond a few dogs, a sledge and a pocketful of hard bread. The dogs died and the food was soon exhausted, but Tilton trudged on week after week through the Arctic winter, with an average of a single frozen fish a day for food. When the whaler thinks of the boatsteerer who travelled alone over the ice pack four or five hundred miles from Herschel Island to Point Barrow, likewise in the cold and darkness of the Arctic winter, they will laugh again at the necessity for elaborate equipment for Arctic travel.
