TUCK'S BODY FOUND WAS HE MURDERED?

Missing Windsor Man's Remains Discovered in Barn With Neck Broken.

Windsor, May 25.—The body of John Tuck was found today by a boy in a barn on the Dougal road within the city limits, and the police are investigating, as it is thought foul play may have caused his death.
Coroner Amyot has decided that an inquest is necessary.
Tuck was a laborer, aged 30, and about a week ago suddenly disappeared from his home here. A search for him was made, but no news of him could be found.
When the body was discovered today, the face and hands were eaten off, and identification was made by the clothing, and the body was removed to Cheyne's undertaking establishment.
It now develops that the man's neck was broken, and this fact leads the police to believe that he met with foul play.

REIMS AMBITIOUS

Will Attempt to Duplicate Last Year's Aviation Meet.
London, May 26.—Reims, whose aviation meeting last year marked an epoch in the progress of flying, will try to duplicate its former success this year. Conditions, however, have changed radically.
Last August aviators were glad to go to Reims and show what they could do. Now they have to be tempted by large prizes. Reims has accordingly drawn up a programme which it hopes will attract the best of the airmen to its hospitable city.
One new attraction will be that the grand prize awarded last year to the aviator who covered the greatest distance in the air, will this year be awarded to the aeroplane constructor whose machine or machines to the number of three fly the longest distance during the meeting. The machine will be drawn up in a line and started at the lowering of a flag, and the course will be across country for a distance of between six and ten miles.
Special prizes will be offered for competition among army officers, and women aviators will have a speed contest of six and a half miles. The elimination contest to choose the pilots to represent France in the international aviation cup race to be held this year in America will take place at the Reims meeting.

HINDPAUGH'S CIRCUS WAS A BIG SUCCESS

Thousands Viewed the Street Parade—A Splendid Performance.

Hindpaugh's circus has come. The big burlesque was put on in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium last night, ushered in by brass bands and usual big street parade. THE BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT GROWS

General Baden-Powell Will Extend Organization to Canada.

London, May 24.—Major-General Baden Powell has retired from the army on half-pay to devote himself to the boy scout movement, which has outgrown all expectations and is now becoming one of the most extensive and popular organizations in the country. General Baden Powell says:

"For the present I intend to devote myself to putting the boy scouts' organization upon a surer foundation by decentralizing it and by giving powers to county organizations. We now have 300,000 members, and I intend to perfect a scheme by which boy scouts will find work in London and scoutmasters may be able to improve their positions. In fact, it will be plain that boys will have everything to gain and nothing to lose by joining."

"On July 1 I am going to Canada to promote the movement there, and afterwards to South Africa. I am convinced the boy scouts can be made a valuable asset to the empire in case of need."

It is recognized throughout the country that the movement is a most salutary one for boys, giving them exercise in the fresh air under discipline and an intelligent occupation which produces marked improvement in their morals.

they use per annum; third, how the men treat the women. In this connection William E. Curtis, the modern newspaper correspondent, has written: "The test of civilization is the estimate of women."
The first item in the threefold analysis above stated gives a clue to how well the people are fed; the second, how clean they keep themselves and their habitations; the last and crowning item tells how high the people have risen in the scale of intelligence, kindness and justice. That is the measure of human progress. What a people think and write about woman, and, what is more important, their demeanor toward her, is the great index of national character. In countries where women are not respected and not permitted to express themselves in the fine arts and to take a reasonable part in professional and commercial affairs, civilization is at low ebb. The status of such a people usually rises by striking off the shackles from woman. Unhand her, give her all the freedom man should enjoy to do the right thing, and the heaven of her thought and activities is bound to elevate the whole nation.—Co-operation.
