Lieutenant-General Viscount Terauchi, the Japanese resident-general of Korea, will leave for Seoul, the Koean capital, on July 15, to confer with Emperor Yi-Syek, of Korea, who is reported to be in a complaisant state of mind in view of the provision made for him, immediate family and other members of the royalty under the annexation arrangements.

Broadly speaking, annexation will mean the wiping out of the hermit kingdom as a nation; the strengthening of the military status of Japan, and an effect upon the financial affairs of all countries doing business with Korea as the flat 5 per cent custom tariff of the present Government is likely to be increased to meet the expense of Japanese administration. Until 1894 China was the suzerain of Korea, but on the conclusion of the

war in 1895, China relinquished her suzerainty and the independence Korea was acknowledged. Following the Russo-Japanese war the paramount interest of Japan in Korea was recognized, and a subsequent treaty between Korea and Japan provided that Japan should control and direct the external relations and affairs of Korea, and be represented at Seoul by a resident-general.
