FIRE CHIEF FAVORS MORE PAY FOR MEN

With Present Schedule Says Cannot Keep Experienced Fire Fighters.

There was a minority meeting of No. 3 committee last night, and although many important matters were on the list for settlement they were all laid over until the next session.

The most important was the demand of the firemen for more pay. In their communication they pointed out that it was impossible to live on the present salary.

Fire Chief Aitken recommended an increase of 25 cents a day to each man. That would bring the pay of the first-year men to \$1.75 per day, or \$68.75 a year; second-year men, \$2.05 a day, or \$77.40 a year; third-year men, \$2.25 a day, or \$82.50 per annum, and fourth-year men, \$2.35 per day, or \$85.75 a year.

The chief pointed out that it was almost impossible to keep experienced men in the department, as they were leaving to obtain more lucrative positions. He declared that the department had saved \$300 on its estimates owing to the fact that second- and third-year men had retired, the difference between the first and third year pay giving a surplus. There was plenty of money to meet the increase.

Mayor Beattie thought the matter had better go over until the next regular sitting of the committee, as this was but a minority meeting.

Mr. A.M. Queen was present on behalf of the London Mineral Bath Company, offering to sell the baths to the city for \$4,000, or the entire property for \$14,500. He thought it a good proposition for the city to purchase this property for baths for the boys and girls, but did not think that a bylaw would pass at this time. It was sent over to next year's council.

Mr. Robert Angus appeared before the committee and stated that he was ready to test the steam fire engine at 24 hours' notice. Connections could either be made at the river or on the hydrant.

All. A. Shipland explained that the underwriters' experts, Inspector Howe and Assistant Engineer Wilson, would be in London to test the machine, for which they would charge the city nothing. The trial will be made as soon as these gentlemen can find it convenient to come to London.

The Mothers' Clubs of the city asked the committee to further define the area for peanut vendors in order to prevent them coming near the public schools. This was also laid over.

Market Clerk Maker was instructed to keep the butchers' pavilion free of horses, as there had been numerous complaints.

Those present were: Ald. A. Shipland, chairman; Ald. Jeffries, Mayor Beattie, Fire Chief Aitken, Inspector McCallum, Market Clerk Maker and Secretary Baker.

CHESLEY PASTOR CALLED

London Junction Presbyterians to Invite Rev. John Hosie.

St. George's Presbyterian Church, London Junction, met last night, decided unanimously to extend a call to Rev. John Hosie, of Chesley, to accept the vacant pastorate of St. George's Church. The call will be considered by the London Presbytery in session next Monday night.

Rev. Mr. Hosie is at present in charge of the Salem Church, Dobbington, in the Bruce Presbytery, and for five years was stationed at Lobo, in the London Presbytery. For some time he also held a western charge, near Brandon, Man.

Mr. Hosie is a native of Scotland and a graduate of Glasgow University.

COMMITTEE FAVORS GUARANTEE BYLAW

Ratepayers Will Vote On North Midland's Request in January.

The citizens will vote on a bylaw at the coming municipal elections to guarantee bonds up to \$200,000 of the North Midland Railway. At the meeting of the finance committee, held yesterday afternoon, the question was again discussed. Messrs. A. E. Welch, G. B. Rumball, R. Southam, William Scarlett and T. H. Lusam, were present for the company. The route, style of construction, and other details were explained by the deputation, following which the committee decided to recommend to the council that a bylaw to guarantee the bonds be submitted to the people.

A communication was read from Mr. D. A. Stewart, stating that he would withdraw his application for a guarantee of the bonds of the London and North Western Railway to the extent of \$150,000. It is understood that some time in 1911 he will ask that a vote be taken, the company bearing the expense.

Those present at the meeting were Ald. Richter (chairman), Ald. Eckert, Ald. Stevenson, Mayor Beattie, and Secretary Baker.

NEW WAY TO LIFT DEBT

Christian Workers' Members Give Day's Wages for the Purpose.

The Christian Workers' Church has adopted a unique plan for lifting a small floating debt. The method is that every wage-earner of the congregation gives his or her day's pay, and those who are not wage-earners select some employment for the day, which nets them on the average of between one and two dollars each. Some of the ladies make pies, bread, cake, or little Christmas novelties, while others knit, scrub or wash. The day set apart is the first day of the month, and is called a day for the Lord Jesus. Those that are working on profits, give their day's profits, and in this way they expect to raise \$250. The church now owns property valued between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with no mortgage whatever against it.

ONTARIO BANK

Shareholders Have Paid Up More Than \$50,000 of Liability.

Toronto, Dec. 1.—Today is the day upon which the double liability contributions of the shareholders of the Ontario Bank fall due, and the indications are that the great bulk of the \$14,250,000, which should be paid up, will be paid without the necessity of the added cost of issuing executions to collect it.

Up to last night, with two clear days before the payments are due, contributions had sent in to the liquidators over \$50,000. A great number of the regular contributors will not mail their checks till tomorrow, and the money will be coming in for the next week.

Those contributors who have notified the liquidators that they will not be able to pay are contributors, for the most part, against whom only small sums are charged.

TWO SUBMARINES RETIRED

One Goes to the Scrap Heap, While the Other Will Be Preserved as a Relic.

Washington, Dec. 1.—Two antiquated war vessels, one of them a relic of the Spanish-American war, have been dropped from the navy of the United States by Secretary Meyer. The Araya, an old unarmored iron gunboat, which originally belonged to Spain, is valueless as a fighting vessel because of its obsolete design and will be sold for the material which it contains.

The Holland, an unarmored submarine torpedo boat, the forerunner of her class, has outlived her usefulness for naval purposes, and her sea history shortly will be closed when she will be taken ashore at the Naval Academy at Annapolis and preserved as a relic. This vessel was commissioned ten years ago and was the first ship of the modern type of submarine torpedo boats bought by the Government.
