

EXPERT WILL CHECK THE SEWER FIGURES

City Desires to Have All Possible Information Before Taking a Vote.

CLEANING OFF THE WALKS

Ald. Blandford Outlines New Area — West London Breakwater Again Discussed.

An independent expert will be engaged by the city to check over the figures of the estimated cost of the storm water sewer system. At the meeting of the board of works Thursday evening this decision was arrived at. The report of the city engineer was not presented, but will be withheld until the opinion of the independent expert is heard. A special meeting of the council will be called for Saturday to authorize the committee to secure the man wanted.

"The opinion is general that we should secure an independent man to go over the maps and figures," said the mayor. "I do not think we should submit prices to the people until we do know that they are right. We have to face this problem of storm water sewerage, and in his opinion, it is quite certain that the provincial board of health will order the city to construct a portion of it."

The members of the committee favored the idea, and the motion of Mayor Graham was passed unanimously.

West London Breakwater. A bylaw calling for the expenditure of \$27,000 for a breakwater for West London will be submitted to the ratepayers. City Engineer Brazier reported that a facing of crushed stone, cement, with a facing of crushed stone, could be built for a cost of approximately \$27,000. This would be a sloping wall, and in his opinion as strong as could be made. It would be perfectly safe also. An upright reinforced concrete wall, with a five-foot base, with the necessary piling, could be built for \$39,000.

The tender of Mr. W. H. Barney to build an upright wall with a four-foot base for the sum of \$48,000 was also submitted.

Idea Condemned. "I have discussed Mr. Barney's idea with a number of engineers and they claim it will not stand," explained Mayor Graham. "The mixture of 7 to 1 is not sufficiently strong, and the foundation was not wide enough. I have received another estimate from a contractor. He states that wall will be necessary to put a concrete wall five feet thick at the base tapering to eight or ten inches at the top, 21 feet high, could be built for \$45,000. Of course, this does not include any filling at the back of the wall. That could be done at least at no great expense. However, I think the proposition suggested by Mr. Brazier, costing \$27,000, should be submitted to the people. In my opinion, it will stand and will give the residents of West London a permanent breakwater. I move that we send it to the ratepayers."

Ald. Moore asked whether or not this work could not be done as a local improvement, with the cost charged against the property in West London. Mayor Graham answered that it could, but declared that the whole of the city should vote on it. His motion was carried without further discussion and another bylaw calling for the expenditure of \$27,000 will be voted on by the citizens.

The Snow Bylaw. The amendment to Blandford bylaw proposed by very briefly by the committee. Mayor Graham asked Ald. Blandford what area he would have the bylaw apply to.

"I would suggest Grosvenor street as the northern boundary," said the mayor. "Oxtown street would be the southern boundary. Rectory street the eastern, and West London street the western. That would practically cover all the area I have in mind. Such a bylaw would not cause any hardship whatever," the mayor said.

"That is satisfactory," said his worship. "However, I think we had better lay the matter over until next Thursday evening and let the mayor, Ald. Blandford and City Engineer Brazier could go over the city, and if necessary extend or lessen the area."

Ald. Blandford was agreeable to that, and a report will be brought in at the next meeting.

Mr. H. P. Elliott, P.E.C., Toronto, was appointed to install the steam heating system from the incinerator to Victoria Hospital.

The Warren Paving Company notified the committee that they could not repair any pavements until next spring.

Mayor Graham thought that better service could be obtained from the paving contractors if a guarantee company were on their bonds. "In that event they will have the guarantee company and the city have the guarantee," said the mayor. "If they do not do their work properly, said his worship, "that would work out to our best interests. That would move that in future all contractors be compelled to give bonds from a guarantee company for the faithful performance of their contract."

Some minor matters were disposed of. Those present were Ald. Moore (chairman), Ald. Blandford, Ald. Coles, Mayor Graham, City Engineer Brazier and Secretary Frank Hughes.

SARNIA ENGAGES WATERWORKS MAN

Mr. Chipman, of Toronto, To Act as a Consulting Engineer.

POPULAR PASTOR CALLED

Rev. Mr. Hawkins Invited to Minister to Baptist Church at Maidstone.

[Special to the Advertiser.] Sarnia, Nov. 22. — A special and important session of the town council was held this evening. The meeting was practically called to order by a consulting engineer before the sun rose on another day, and notwithstanding fierce opposition from seven of the councilmen, the purpose for which the session was called was attained.

The usual preliminary municipal business was disposed of in short order, after which Dr. Morrison, chairman of the fire and water committee, read letters from three prominent consulting engineers in which they stated the remuneration they would expect if retained by the town on the new waterworks question. Mr. Chipman, of Toronto, however, came in person and appeared to create a favorable impression, besides which his terms were much more reasonable than those of the others. A motion was made to retain this well-known expert by one faction, and the other side made an amendment to consider the claims of the other engineers, first before deciding whom to engage. A vote of the ayes and nays was taken and resulted in a seven to seven tie.

Broke Tie Vote. Ald. Lawrence, sitting in the chair, then threw his vote in favor of the main motion, and Mr. Chipman was retained.

The next matter of importance occurred over the asking for tenders. The side which lost on the first motion insisted that the consulting expert inspect the plans and specifications before the tenders are advertised. The opposition moved that the fire and water committee be given authority to ask for tenders on the pipe, boilers, machinery, etc., and at the same time that it was not necessary for the expert to pass an opinion until after the tenders are received. Again a vote of the ayes and nays was taken, and the result was another tie of seven and seven, but this time Mr. Lawrence cast his vote in favor of the former faction. In fact, at both stages of the bidding, the majority was to be commended by those who are familiar with the question.

The terms on which Mr. Chipman was engaged consisted of a retainer fee of \$1,000, and \$25 a day for his services, his expenses also to be paid.

Call for Mr. Hawkins. Rev. Mr. Hawkins, the well-known and popular minister of the Central Baptist Church, received a call last night to the Maidstone Church. His message came as a surprise to Mr. Hawkins, who was just preparing to leave for over four years now, and in that time has won the respect and liking of not only his congregation, but the community as well.

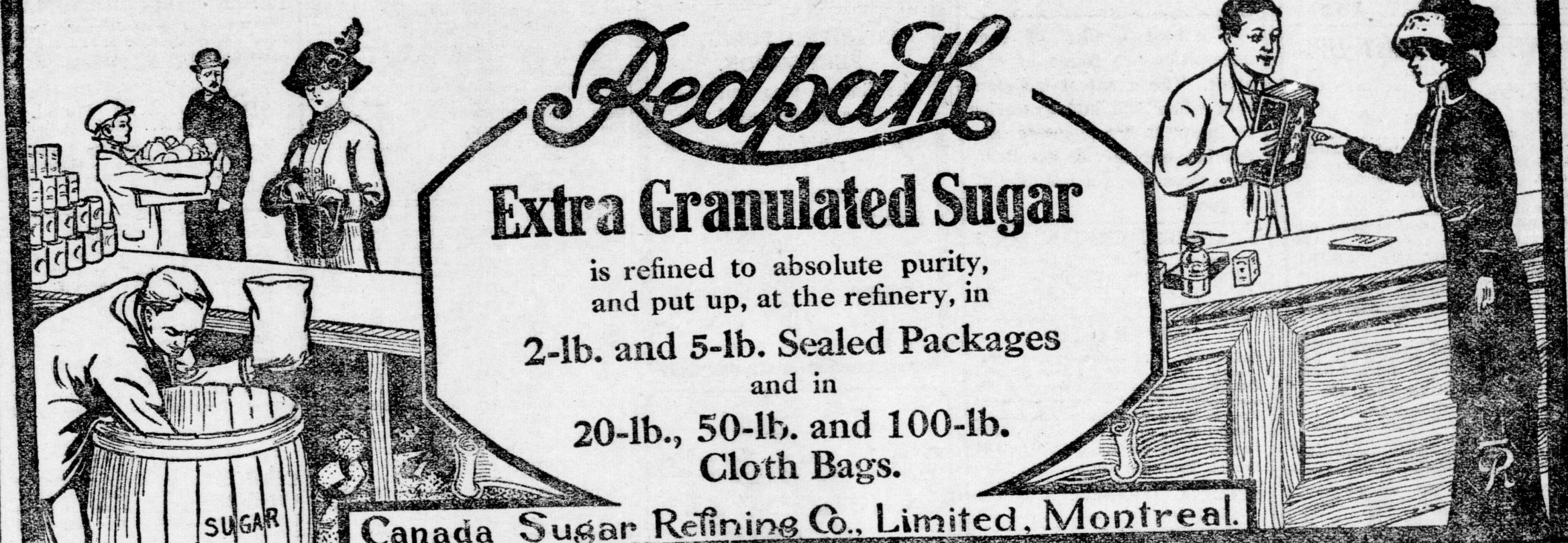

QUAKE TOPPLES CHURCH WHILE MASS BEING SAID

Town of Acambay in Northern Mexico Wiped Out by a Seismic Shock.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, Nov. 22. — The town of Acambay, in the northern part of the State of Mexico, is practically in ruins, as a result of the earthquake there on Tuesday. Fifty-nine bodies have been removed from the ruins of a church and other buildings. Many more are still buried in the wreckage. The injured will number hundreds. Scarcely a house or public building is standing intact.

STORAGE RATES ARE CAUSE FOR CRITICISM

Shippers of London Are Denouncing a Recent Boost by Railways.

The increase of storage charges of freight by all Canadian railways, which was recently decided upon to take effect on Dec. 9, and which has been ratified by the Dominion railway commission, is causing the keenest comment among merchants, manufacturers and all others affected.

Hitherto the storage charges have been 2 cents per hundred pounds per week, but after Dec. 9th 3 cents will be charged the first week and 6 cents per hundred each week thereafter. The days of grace are also to be reduced from four to three.

"This change certainly will make a big difference to shippers," a railway freight man told The Advertiser, "and that is the intention. Business is rushing now and we are handling an exceptionally heavy amount of traffic. Consequently every freight house is crowded and crowded because the shippers will not get their goods away."

"When this new schedule goes into effect we expect that this trouble will be relieved to a great degree, because shippers will not be so lax as they have been in the past."

The complaints of those who have been in the habit of leaving goods in the freight houses at the old schedule rates are well founded, as it is now estimated that the freight transportation and storage charges will sometimes exceed the value of the consignments.
