

LOST BOY FOUND SLEEPING IN CAR

ST. CATHARINES, May 16.—Two levels of the old Welland Canal at Merritt were dragged yesterday with the expectation of finding the body of 10-year-old William Boucock who disappeared from his home on Thursday last. This morning the Merritt authorities were advised that the lad had been found sleeping peacefully in a box car in the G. T. R. yards at

Hamilton. The boy is a cousin of little Margaret Boucock, for whose murder David McNeil was tried last fall and acquitted.

PASSENGER IS MISSING.
MONTREAL, May 16.—The White Star liner Megantic, on arrival here, reported the disappearance of a second cabin passenger, G. H. Turner, who, with his brother John was en route to his home in Calgary. The missing man left his brother and another passenger in the smoking room about 10:30 the first night at sea and that was the last seen of him.

EDUCATION BOARD TO ASK COUNCIL TO ISSUE DEBENTURES

Cost of Central Collegiate Will Be Trifle Over \$306,000.

TIME PENALTY PROVIDED

Building Must Be Completed Not Later Than December 31.

The board of education yesterday afternoon decided to request the city council to authorize the issuing of debentures for \$306,000 for the erection and equipment of the new collegiate institute. The contract for the building specifies that it is to be built for a little more than \$306,000 and to be completed by December 31. Of the debentures, \$35,000 worth to cover the cost of equipment are to be for ten years, and the remaining \$265,000 for 20 years. This latter amount and \$55,000 which is the remainder of the insurance account will cover the cost of erection. The account originally consisted of \$70,000, but part of it was paid out for the widening of the old high school building.

Trustee Eggett asked what the penalty was in case the contract was not fulfilled as to the time when the building was to be completed. He was told that there was a penalty of \$200.

"If you hold a penalty over their heads you're a robber," he declared. He thought that a better class of work could be done than this penalty was abolished.

When the question of providing the board architect with assistance in the supervision of the work, Trustee Eggett declared that that backed up his statement.

It was decided that the matter of aid in supervision be left in the hands of the architect and the chairman of No. 3 committee of the board.

Trustee Thomas Rowe wanted to know what a Mr. Robinson, an employee of the board in Architect L. E. Carruthers' department was doing. It was said that he would probably be engaged in No. 2 committee's work all summer.

Staff Changes Authorized.
The chairman of No. 3 committee, and the principal were instructed to make such changes in the collegiate staff by next September as was deemed advisable.

No. 2 committee asked for power to let tenders for Victoria School at noon today. Members of the board said they had faith in No. 2 committee and would grant this request, if the committee was unanimous on the matter. As they voted unanimously, it was decided that No. 2 committee will meet at 4 o'clock this afternoon to open the tenders and make a recommendation. Then at 5:15 o'clock the board will meet to hear its recommendation.

The advisory industrial committee report recommending that part of lot 22, known as the Brown estate at 510 King street, which adjoining the Technical School property be purchased for \$10,500, was adopted. The report also included a recommendation that the city council be asked to issue 20-year debentures to cover this amount.

For Recreation Grounds.
The property has a 70-foot frontage and a depth of 214 feet. The house on it is a solid brick one of ten rooms with slate roof, hardwood floors, and all modern conveniences, including hot water heating. It was said that, although the property was not needed at present, except to serve as recreation grounds, it would be needed later, as the number of pupils at the school was increasing rapidly. Where it was thought advisable to buy it now, rather than when the price was higher. It was mentioned that if the board did not buy it another house was to be built on the property, thus enhancing its value.

STRATFORD COUNCIL GIVES HOSPITAL \$1,800

STRATFORD, May 16.—The council at its regular meeting today granted \$1,800 to the General Hospital trust to assist in the building of the new wing. The traffic bylaw was also passed.

Word has been received of the death in Montreal of Walter Marshall, aged 88. He was born in Granby, Que., in 1833, and came to Stratford in 1856, where he entered in business as a contractor. He went to Sarnia and Petrolia at the time of the oil boom, later settling in Stratford. He died at Stratford 30 years ago. Mrs. R. R. Hay of Listowel is a daughter.

SERIOUSLY INJURED WHEN AUTO UPSET

SARNIA, May 17.—John H. Hurst, 172 Harkness street, timekeeper at the Imperial Oil, Limited, received a broken collarbone, an injured shoulder and probably a late spinal injury when his auto struck some loose gravel on the fourth line, just outside the city limits, earlier this morning. He was taken to hospital, where he is recovering. His daughter, who accompanied him, was slightly injured.

ENGINEERS AND FIREMEN WILL FIGHT WAGE CUT

Proposals of New York Central Railway Are Rejected.

BUFFALO, May 16.—Proposals of the New York Central Railroad Company to reduce wages were rejected by representatives of the road's engineers and firemen after four hours of secret conference here today.

WILL FIGHT REDUCTION.

OTTAWA, May 16.—The organizations representing the employees of the Canadian National Railways will vigorously oppose any attempt toward a general reduction of wages, according to Mr. A. R. Mosher, grand president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees. Commenting on the report from Toronto that the railroads had notified the different brotherhoods to the effect that a revision of schedules would be sought, Mr. Mosher stated that the notice had also been received by his organization.

FROSTS KILLED EARLY TOMATOES

Market Gardeners Sustain a Heavy Loss in District Around Hamilton.

HAMILTON, May 16.—A heavy frost during the night caused considerable damage in this district. Throughout the Burlington market garden district the early potatoes and tomatoes were entirely destroyed. These plants were coming along regularly well as a result of the advanced season, but the sharp break in the weather caught them all. Beans and asparagus also present, except in the latter case the damage is only a temporary one. Some fear is also entertained for the strawberries, which are all in. Throughout the Niagara Valley the damage was not so extensive, the tree fruits coming through without any loss. The season has been two weeks ahead of normal planting time. Usually the young hotbed plants are placed in the ground about May 24, but this year spring encouraged some of the big gardeners to take a chance. Potatoes have suffered a severe loss of at least three weeks as in many cases fresh planting will have to be done.

SENDING HIS LIQUOR BACK TO DISTILLERY

Simcoe Resident Will Remove Temptation From Would-Be Thieves.

SIMCOE, May 16.—Movement of ten barrels of whiskey and several cases of French liquors from the home of H. J. Brook to the distillery began today. The liquor was rolled out onto the lawn in front of the house, where it attracted many. Mr. Brook, who recently had \$800 worth of liquor stolen from his vaults, is depleting his cellar in order that it may not again be a temptation to would-be liquor thieves. Two Brantford boys, Steve Mason and Fred Farnell, are out on \$10,000 bail, charged with the theft of the liquor, and come up for trial at the spring assizes.

Mr. Brook stated at the preliminary hearing of the two youths that his cellar would no more be the temptation to thieves, as he intended sending the liquor back to the distillery.

P. S. COATES HEADS CHATHAM C. OF C.

Hustling Maple City Organization Is Doing Splendid Work.

CHATHAM, May 16.—P. S. Coates was unanimously elected president of the Chatham Chapter of Commerce at the inaugural meeting of the new directorate this afternoon. Other officers elected were: first vice-president, A. Dale; second vice-president, Charles Austin; board secretary, Harry Colman; treasurer, Fred Bisset.

The new board outlined a program for the year's work. The work of the chamber of commerce during the past year has more than justified its existence. Many works were taken up that would otherwise have met with little support. Among the activities for which they directly are responsible is a genuine feeling of cordiality between employers and employees; the organization and formation of a playgrounds committee, operating in conjunction with the separate school board and the board of education; the bringing of several new factories to the city, and an exceptionally keen interest in the administrative affairs of the city.

WOULD PROSECUTE THOSE WHO NEGLECT THEIR FAMILIES

Lives Often Lost For Want of Medical Attention, Says Doctor.

TORONTO, May 16.—Discussing diseases and other causes of death, Dr. H. Ross, Clifford, Ont., administered a severe rebuke to disobedient patients who think they can save money by not keeping their appointments. He explained, in addressing the Ontario Medical Association today, that he was speaking of rural practice, illustrating the falsity of the economy which some heads of households often practiced. He said that he had seen a number of actual cases in which lives were lost for want of timely medical attention. The doctor waxed warm as he spoke of "autocrats of the home," who neglected their families, and advocated public prosecution of all such "moral delinquents." He would exact "skin for skin" in the old-fashioned way if he had jurisdiction over them, because they were "really and morally criminal."

For the sick poor he advocated generous attention from the profession. Dr. Roberts, Hamilton, said if the public learned the wisdom of reporting communicable diseases at the very first sign and thus made it possible to administer the anti-toxin within the first 24 hours, the death rate from these diseases would be practically nil.

Dr. F. T. Green, Stoney Creek, devoted his address on home influence on resistance against disease, to a spirited attack on the present-day social habits. To insure a more virile manhood and womanhood, he declared, the people of Toronto had to return to the idea of regeneration and abandon the new fangled passion for regulation.

INCOME TAXES NET GOVT. \$46,381,806

Total Collections Up To Last Saturday Were \$34,485,640.

OTTAWA, May 16.—At question time in the House of Commons today, Fernand Renfert, St. James, was informed that collections under the income tax for the year 1920-21 amounted to \$46,381,806.64; of this amount \$9,597,211.13 were collections made on assessments based on income for the calendar years 1917 and 1918; \$32,685,620.24 for the calendar year 1919 and \$4,098,965.27 applying to calendar year 1920.

Total collections of income tax for 1921, based on 1919 income, were \$34,485,640.61. The sum of \$13,451,809.99 was collected through the collection of corporations in 1920-21 in addition to collections made under the business profits tax act 1916, and part one of the special war revenue act 1915.

WILL SPEND \$10,000 IMPROVING ROADWAY

Work on Tillsonburg Highways To Commence Immediately.

TILLSONBURG, May 16.—Work on the road between the town and the province between the 10th and 11th concession on North Broadway will start this week. This work will cost between \$9,000 and \$10,000.

A large repair gang is busy installing a new platform at the end of the trunk warehouse on Hale street to be used for unloading horses, autos and heavy machinery.

The local horticultural society had a beautiful display of tulips in the window of Kilian & Ostrander, Broadway, for two days, under the direction of Mrs. Gibson, Mrs. Van and Miss Mero.

The town has been without garbage collection well over eight months, and so far the council has not solved the problem this season, much to the perplexity of local housewives. It is understood that the local teamster offered to collect the garbage at a rate of 50 cents a month per house, provided a suitable dumping ground could be had.

F. M. Meyers, a well-known merchant of Shelby, Mich., passed away here after a long illness. He came to town hoping the climate would benefit his health, but it was of no avail. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. H. Brooks, and a prominent Mason.

The funeral of Alexander Brenner was held on Sunday afternoon, King Street Lodge, P. O. and A. M. No. 8, attending in a body. The pallbearers were: Dr. McQueen, A. S. Rennie, H. Sponenburgh, V. A. Sinclair, C. H. Denton and Mayor Dean.

OTTAWA, May 16.—Detective Paul Miller of the R. C. M. P., returned today from Neepawa, Man., with Robert Kenneth Walker, formerly of the department of militia, who was formally charged in police court today with obtaining money from the department by false pretences. Walker was remanded a week to facilitate evidence.

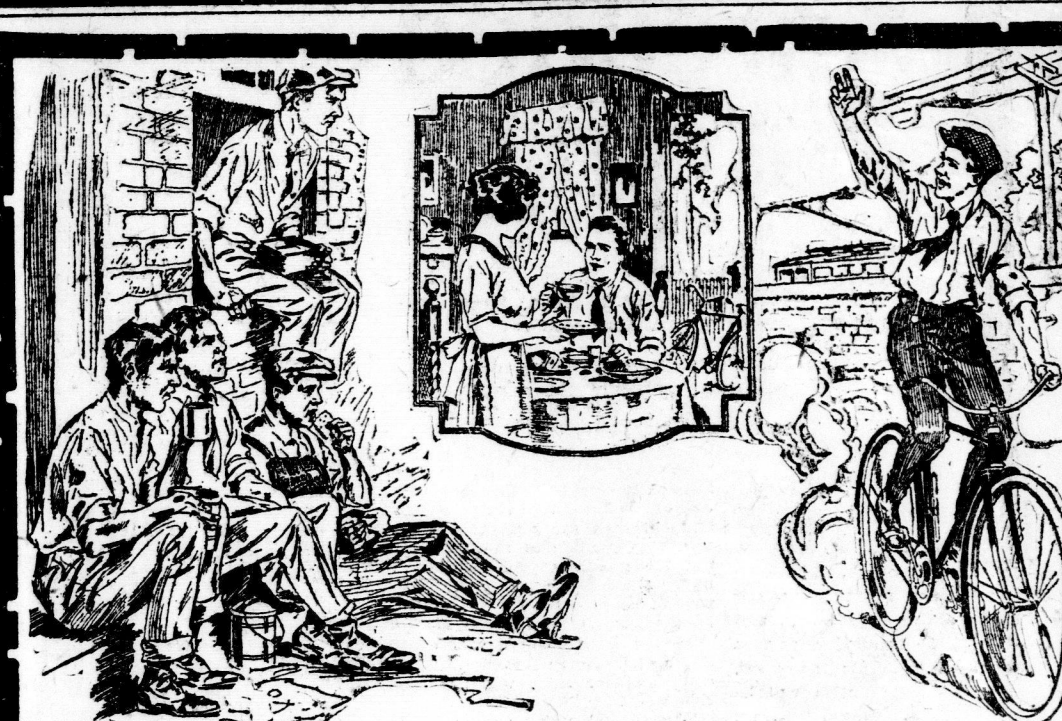
