Cost of Central Collegiate Will 88. 1833, Be Trifle Over \$306,000.

TIME PENALTY PROVIDED

Building Must Be Completed SERIOUSLY INJURED Not Later Than December 31.

The board of education yesterday fternoon decided to request the city ouncil to authorize the issuing of deentures for \$300,000 for the erection and equipment of the new collegiate The contract for the buildng specifies that it is to be built for a little more than \$306,000 and to be completed by December 31. Of the debentures, \$35,000 worth to cover the cost of equipment are to be for ten years, and the remaining \$265,000 for 20 years. This latter amount and \$55,000 which is the remainder of the insurance

which is the remainder of the insurance account will cover the cost of erection. The account originally consisted of \$70,000, but part of it was paid out for the wrecking of the old high school building.

Trustee Eggett asked what the penalty was in case the contract was not fulfilled as to the time when the building was to be completed. He was told that there was a penalty of \$200.

TORONTO, May 16.—Discussing diseases and other causes of death. Dr. H. Ross, Clifford, Ont., administered a severe rebuke at disobedient patients who think they can save money by not keeping their appointments. ### INCOME TAXES NET GOVT. \$46,381,806

Total Collections Up To Last Saturday Were \$34,485,640.

OTTAWA, May 16.—At question time in the House of Commons today. Fernand Renfret, St. James, was informed that collections under the income war \$46,381,806.64; of this amount \$9,597.211,13\$ were collections made on assessments based on income for the calendar years 1917 and 1918; \$32,685,630.24 for the calendar year 1919 and \$4,098,965.27 applying to calendar year 1920. Total collections to date as at May 14, 1921, based on 1919 income, were \$34,495,640.61. The sum of \$13,481,809.99 was collected through income tax on corporations in 1929-21 in addition to collections made under the business profits war tax act 1916, and part one of the special war revenue act 1915.


