

UNIONISTS RETIRING SOUTH ESSEX

Announcement Is Severe Blow To Hopes of Meighen Supporters.

EDWARDS ATTACKS DRURY

Frontenac Member Tries To Sidestep Big Federal Issues.

[Special To The Advertiser.]
ESSEX, July 26.—Dr. J. W. Brien, M. P. for South Essex, will retire from political life when the federal government goes to the people, he told a meeting of supporters of the Meighen administration at Essex this afternoon. The announcement that he would not be a candidate for re-election came as a surprise to Dr. Brien's supporters, who had assembled to discuss steps towards the reorganization of the constituency in the interests of the Conservative party.

Dr. Brien was elected as a Union Conservative in 1917. He served in the Canadian army medical corps overseas for four years and entered the campaign two weeks before the election.

His decision not to seek re-election came as a blow to supporters, who feel that he is their only hope in the next general election. Dr. Edwards, M. P. for Frontenac, addressed the meeting in the interests of the Meighen administration. He defended the Borden and Meighen administrations and dealt at length with the tariff issue, pointing out that tobacco raisers of Essex county who are endeavoring at present to have the duty on imported tobacco raised, would be left without any protection if the platforms of the Liberals or Farmer Progressive parties were put in effect.

Rap at Drury.
Though dealing with most part with federal questions the member for Frontenac turned aside from his principal theme long enough to administer a few raps to the Drury Government.
"What is the precious brand of political novices doing at Queen's Park?" he asked. "Are they implementing their pre-election promises of economical management of provincial affairs? No, they have turned civil servants and their offices in the legislative buildings in order to provide private apartments for cabinet ministers. Manning Dechery has a mahogany bedstead and other costly appointments. Premier Drury has secured the famous one hundred dollar suit and the handsome bannister rails of the stairs and rush about the corridors of the Noble Building. Can you imagine such a waste of affairs?"

Can See No Hope.
Dr. Fred H. Brisco, of the Conservative party in South Essex, was asked to address the meeting. His words had a practically total effect upon the audience as he expressed his opinion that the government had no hope of either success or survival at the next election, unless they united or were able to bring about a disaffection in the ranks of the Farmers' party.

CHATHAM MAYOR SAYS GAS RATE IS TOO HIGH

Award Will Be Discussed At Meeting On Friday.

CHATHAM, July 26.—In an interview today Mayor F. H. Brisco, president of the Municipal Gas Consumers' Association, stated that he was not at all satisfied with Referee Henderson's decision in regard to the rates to be charged for natural gas. He claimed that during the recent inquiry held in this city that the referees were ignored by the referee.

Thinks It High.
"I am still of the opinion that the award given by the referee is too high," he stated this morning. The award will be discussed in detail at a special meeting of the consumers which will be held in this city on Friday next. In the meantime, O. L. Lewis, K.C., city solicitor, is in Toronto looking after the interest of the city consumers and E. L. Bracklin is also there on behalf of all consumers in Western Ontario.

DUTIES ON PRODUCE WOULD BE HEAVY

OTTAWA, July 26.—(Canadian Press.)—Duties amounting to \$27,223,237.57 would be levied on Canadian farm produce exported to the United States under the provisions of the proposed new United States tariff, according to a statement today at the department of agriculture. The duties are based on the volume of exports to the United States of twelve different articles of Canadian farm produce during the year 1920.

DORCHESTER TO RECEIVE HYDRO AT EARLY DATE

Start Will Be Made On Many Rural Lines In Three Weeks.

TORONTO, July 26.—A start will be made within three weeks by the Ontario Hydro Commission on the extension of the hydro power into the rural sections of Ontario, under the new legislation providing Government subsidies up to half the cost of the new lines. The commission expects to have 150 miles of new lines completed before the snow flies. Salford Township, east of Hamilton, will probably be the scene of the initial operations, but early attention will be given to Dorchester Township, near London, and to the district surrounding the town of Prescott.

CONTRACTORS CUT WAGES IN TORONTO

Hope To Get Much-Delayed Building Started Shortly.

TORONTO, July 26.—Toronto building contractors today announced a cut in wages, effective at once. Some days ago the Builders' Exchange conferred with the unions connected with the building trades and the minister of labor, Senator Gordon Robertson, and pointed out that there was a good chance of a large amount of building proceeding in Toronto if the workmen would agree to a reasonable reduction in wages. After consulting the rank and file, the union leaders yesterday informed the exchange that they did not recognize the closed shop, and had always operated under the "open shop" system. The amount of the wage cut would be disclosed.

9,000 OUT OF WORK IN CITY OF TORONTO

TORONTO, July 26.—It is the estimate of Capt. Meath, superintendent of the Ontario Government unemployment offices, that approximately 9,000 men are out of work in the city at the present time. To these might be added 1,315 men registered at S. Arnold, superintendent of the civil unemployment bureau on Bay street, making a total, in spite of probable overlapping in a few cases between the two bureaux, of nearly 10,000 men.

LUCAS RESIGNATION TO PREMIER

Will Cease To Be a Member of Hydro Commission Shortly.

TORONTO, July 26.—Hon. I. B. Lucas, member of the provincial hydro-electric power commission, placed his resignation in the hands of Hon. E. C. Drury, prime minister, tonight, and will cease to be a member of the board within the month.

Mr. Lucas joined the commission while attorney-general in the Heaton Government, and has given valuable service to the hydro-electric system. Dealing with Mr. Lucas' resignation, the Mail and Empire says that for some time Mr. Lucas has been slated to resign. The government has now succeeded in gaining majority control of the commission.

The Mail adds: "With a new member in Mr. Lucas' place the Drury Government will have two nominees on the commission, and back of the decision to make the change now is said to be the movement of the Farmers' Union to rearrange the present hydro system and bring it more directly under the control of the government. The shift will also give the Government an advantage in handling the radial problem."

ONTARIO GOVT. TO GUARANTEE BONDS FOR HYDRO DEAL

Will Help City of Toronto Swing Deal For MacKenzie Interests.

TORONTO, July 26.—The Ontario Government came to a decision today to guarantee the \$15,000,000 of hydro bonds necessary to swing the deal for the transfer of the MacKenzie power and radial interests to the hydro commission and the city. At the same time the government decided not to guarantee the \$100,000 of bonds for the rehabilitation of the Metropolitan Railway, one of the MacKenzie radials, to be taken over. The hydro commission has never come into the market with its own guaranteed bonds and to raise the \$100,000 may entail costly financing. A solution, which is said to find favor, is for the government to provide legislation empowering the city to finance the rebuilding of the Metropolitan Railway. While the decision of the Government advances the big clean-up deal considerably, it is still several obstacles to get over.

Held Conference.
The city conferred today with representatives of the County of York, who have freight services rights through the Metropolitan Railway on Yonge street and a distance of about three miles within the city limits. Annexation of this territory by the city has not affected the city's transportation rights, it is understood.

Opening the conference Mayor Church said: "There are just three things holding up the clean-up deal now: the guarantee of the hydro bonds by the Provincial Government, the guarantee of title and the claim of the county to a freight service on Yonge street." The mayor said the city was determined to get the deal through, and that the city would not consent to anything that would not be in the best interests of the city.

WAS BIGGS TO GIVE COST OF HIGHWAYS

Wilson Sends Open Letter To Minister Asking For Information.

TORONTO, July 26.—Gordon C. Wilson, M. P. for Wentworth, who on the platform and in the press has charged Hon. F. C. Biggs, Ontario minister of public works, with extravagance in his highway building operations, has addressed an open letter to the minister, calling upon him to answer the following questions, among others:

What amount of money has been spent on road-building, equipment, trucks, automobiles and stone-quarry machinery by the department of public works of Ontario from January 1, 1920, to July 1, 1921?

What portion of overhead expense is charged to highway construction?

What is the cost of date of that completed paved section of the Hamilton-Kitchener highway between the residence of the minister of public works of Ontario (easterly towards Dundas) to that point where the pavement stops (opposite the recently-acquired property of Mr. Biggs, Sen.)? Give the distance.

Under the Canada highways act, whereby a subsidy is granted the province, regulations call for the letting of contracts by public tender and the advertising of the same in journals and newspapers. Was the contract for the Hamilton-Brantford highway given to the Warren Paving Company under such conditions?

HAIR STORM AT GALT HEAVIEST IN MANY YEARS
