

CHURCHES TO HOLD OPEN AIR SERVICES

Special Programs Arranged Tonight To Close Temperance Campaign.

BANDS WILL AID

Open-air temperance services will be held by many London churches tonight between 7 and 8 o'clock. Most of the clergymen and ministers have promised to speak, and the bands of the Salvation army will help with the musical part of the services in as many places as possible.

These meetings are inter-denominational and the members of every church in any of the groups which have been arranged for the meetings will meet together at the places appointed.

While some churches have not been able to make arrangements for these meetings, the following services have been arranged:

Group 1.—At the corner of Emory and Edward streets, at 7. At the corner of Langarth and Cathcart at 8. On Briscoe, between Edward and Cathcart, at 8:30. Rev. J. A. Agnew will be one of the speakers, and the group includes Ridout street Methodist, St. James' Anglican, Knox Presbyterian, Wortley road Baptist, and Askini street Methodist.

Group 2.—At the corner of Hamilton road and Egerton street, at 7. The group includes Egerton street Baptist, Hamilton road Presbyterian, Hyatt avenue Methodist, and Grace Methodist. Rev. W. E. Millson and Rev. R. J. McCormick will speak.

Group 3.—At the corner of Richmond and Huron streets at 7. At the corner of Adelaide and Oxford at 7:30. The group includes Robinson Memorial, New St. James' Presbyterian, Colborne street Methodist, and Maitland street Baptist. Rev. James MacKay and Rev. W. L. Hiles will speak.

Group 4.—At the corner of Horton and Maitland at 8. The group includes Wellington street Methodist, Chalmers Presbyterian, and Southern Congregational. Rev. G. T. Watts and Rev. H. B. Storey will speak.

T. W. McFARLAND WILL RUN AGAIN

Public Utilities Commissioner to Seek Re-election—R. J. Webster Undecided.

T. W. McFarland, whose fourth term of office as member of the public utilities commission expires on Dec. 31 next, has announced that he will again offer his services as a commissioner for the ensuing term of two years.

R. J. Webster, the other commissioner whose term expires this year, told The Advertiser today that he was not prepared as yet to make an announcement regarding his candidature for next year.

Mr. McFarland was first elected to the utilities commission in 1915 and has been a member ever since. He was chairman of the commission in 1921, being succeeded by Jared Vining, who is the present chairman of the commission.

It has been the exception rather than the rule for Mr. McFarland to have to contest an election as commissioner, since during the whole tenure of his office he has secured more acclamations to office than he has had elections to fight.

Mr. Webster, on the other hand, is completing his first term as a member of the commission. Mayor G. A. Wenige may or may not be a member of the commission next year. Time alone will tell. He has, however, announced his candidature for a third year as mayor.

Jared Vining and Philip Pasocok complete the membership of the commission, their terms running until December, 1925.

"Absolutely not. I have enough troubles now."

As yet, no opposition has been found for the present incumbent, George Womersley, who is declared to be ready to offer himself for a third term. Should Mr. Womersley be returned by acclamation he will create a record for sequence in office, as well as having two acclamations in succession.

Mr. Pace, who was 67 years of age, was a prominent member of St. George's lodge, No. 42, A. E. and A. M. Members of the Masonic order attended in a body. Thomas Shaw, Allen Taylor, J. E. Little, James Love, Harvey Davis and William Davis acted as pallbearers.

Services at the home were conducted by Rev. Mr. Steadman. The Masonic order had charge of the services at the grave. Interment was made at Woodland cemetery.

Mr. Pace is survived by his wife, three sons, Harry, Arthur of Toronto and William, and one daughter, Mrs. Charles O'Dell of Lambeth.

BRANTFORD OFFICIALS PROBE UTILITIES HERE

Mayor Billo and City Treasurer Bunnell of Brantford were in the city yesterday investigating the system whereby the public utilities commission controls the administration of hydro and water departments.

The city of Brantford is considering combining its hydro, gas, and water departments, which at present control the water, hydro and street railway departments. The Brantford officials had previously visited Galt, where one commission has control of both hydro and water departments.

The visitors called upon City Clerk Sam Baker and also Manager E. V. Buchanan, both of whom explained the system as it exists in London. They expressed themselves as favourably impressed by the efficiency of the system in operation here.

FOX AND SANSONE AWAIT COUNSEL

Appeal Is Being Prepared For New Trial Following Return.

Thomas Fox and Sylvadore Sansone, brought back from Kingston penitentiary early yesterday morning by Governor Byron Dawson and a constable, because of the refusal of Warden Ponsford to accept the prisoners until the 40-day appeal limit had lapsed, are now awaiting action by their counsel, who is preparing an appeal, asking among other things for a new trial.

Counsel for the men who are sentenced to the penitentiary with lashes by Mr. Justice Riddell last Saturday, stated today that he was working on the appeal, which would be forwarded to Toronto as soon as completed.

Warden Ponsford stated that he acted on orders received from Ottawa which stated that men sentenced to death or whippings had 40 days from time of sentence to appeal the case. Fox intimated to the warden that he was going to appeal his case and was therefore brought back to the city.

Sheriff Graham is in receipt of no such orders and sent the men on to Kingston as required by jail regulation.

The whole matter is being taken up with the attorney-general's department by the crown attorney.

INSURANCE IS EXPLAINED IN LONDON FORESTERS

About 200 members of the Canadian Order of Foresters of the city and district were present in Ulster hall Monday evening to hear Alfred P. Van Soeren, high secretary, A. R. Galpin, high treasurer, and A. C. Wiley, superintendent of organization, speak regarding the favorable legislation recently enacted in connection with the order, whereby members have now the option of taking paid-up certificates or transferring to some other plan of insurance of which seven are now being written.

The readjustment of rates which became effective recently the order lost only a small percentage of their membership. They have at the present time over 65,000 members. Harry Pierce, D.D.H.C.R. of this city, acted as chairman of the meeting.

U. S. GOVERNMENT CLAIMS PROFITEERING IN OIL

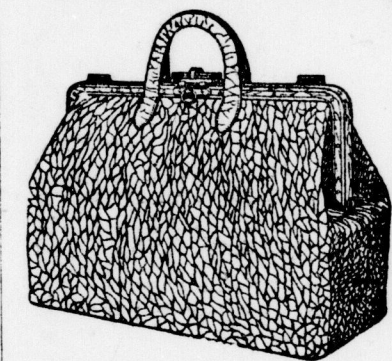

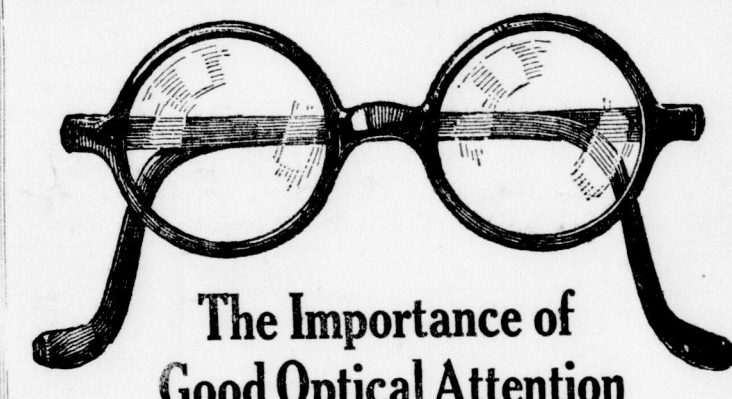

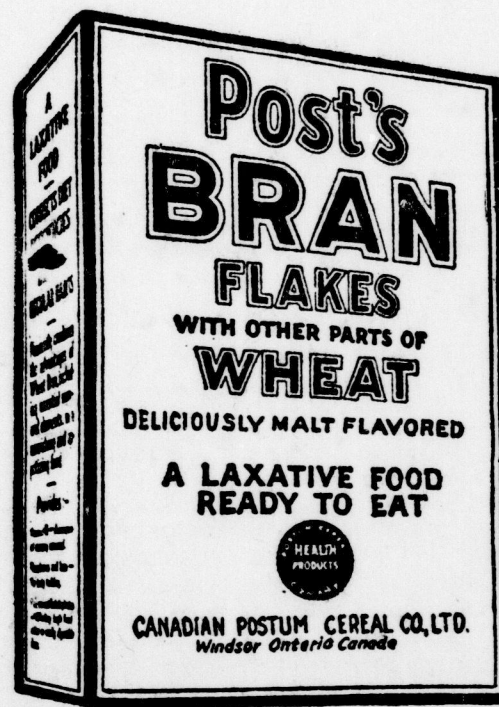
