The chief justice in giving his decision read his reasons after a review of the cases in question. He declared that it was not possible to lay down an inflexible rule about giving bail after conviction pending appeal. All persons, he said, must be presumed innocent until they were proven guilty. If a conviction were set aside by appeal it made the persons innocent and it would not be right to have them in jail in the meantime, to have them in jail in the meantime.

Not Establishing Precedent.

that every person after conviction "I am not laying down the rule should get bail if they appeal," said his lordship.

His lordship said that the nature of the offense, the character of the men, their connections, etc., must go a long way in the decision. The appeals in this case were not frivolous, but substantial, and the men concerned were worthy, respectable citizens engaged in legitimate callings in Montreal. The accused would be in no way respons ble for the delay in hearing of their ippeals, and many weeks would necessarily elapse before they could be heard. If the appeals went through at that late date and the conviction reversed, then injury would have been done to innocent men. He, therefore, admitted them to the same bail as before. In the new bail bonds the accused are to be allowed to go anywhere in Canada allowed to go anywhere in Canada nstead of Ontario only, as in the in-erim bail granted Monday.




