NO NEED IN LONDON FOR KU KLUX KLAN

Mayor Resents the Suggestion That City Requires To Be "Cleaned Up."

London needs no Ku Klux Klan for "clean-up" purposes. This is the warning from Mayor George Wenige, chairman of the police commission, relative to the declaration credited to "an alderman" that the Klan had established a local in this city and had attracted within the charmed but secret circle "many of the best men and women in town."

"There is no need for the Ku Klux Klan or any other Klan in London for the purpose of cleaning up," he being reported, "many of the best men and women in town."

"There is nothing here so wrong that it has to be cleaned up. This is one of the cleanest places in the Dominion, and if it is correct, although I doubt it, that Klan sympathizers and organizers are at work here, they had better watch their step."

Mayor Wenige warns that hooded bands and so-called "night riders" will receive short shrift here.

STREET RAILWAY CO.

IS WARMLY PRAISED

Mayor and Old Boys' Secretary Say They Have "Played the Game."

The London Street Railway has "played the game" during Old Boys' Week.

This is the opinion today from Mayor Wenige and Edwin Smith, secretary of the local Old Boys' Association.

"I don't believe any corporation anywhere would have done the same," the secretary stated to The Advertiser. "They have certainly given us everything in the manner of co-operation, and they have gone out of their way to give extra service to the citizens and their visiting friends and relatives. I know this, as I have been naturally in close touch with the situation all week."

Mayor Wenige is equally emphatic in his praise of the street railway company, both officials and men.

"They have done splendidly," he declared. "The railway authorities and their employees have certainly attended to their part during the week and lent their share of co-operation to the success. The company is all right and getting better."

SAYS STORING WHEAT ON FARMS NO GOOD

Chicago Board of Trade President Declares Scheme Unsound.

Chicago, Aug. 9.—The plan advanced by the American Farm Bureau Federation to store 200,000,000 bushels of wheat on the farms in the hope of raising prices was declared today to be unsound, impracticable, and of no permanent benefit to the farmer, by John J. Stream, president of the Chicago Board of Trade.

Farmers in distress are not those with storage facilities, nor are they financially able to construct such containers, Mr. Stream said. If storage space was available and if farmers were a unit in following the plan it would still be far from solution, he added.

"Keeping wheat off the market never has and never will, change the supply and demand status," he declared. "It would simply add to the confusion that has resulted from agitation and ridiculous public pronouncements by ill-advised politicians. We must get rid of the surplus. If held until next year it would have to compete with the new crop."

PLAN TO RECONSTRUCT BRANTFORD BUILDING

Mickle-Dymont & Son Likely To Rebuild Plant Destroyed By Fire.

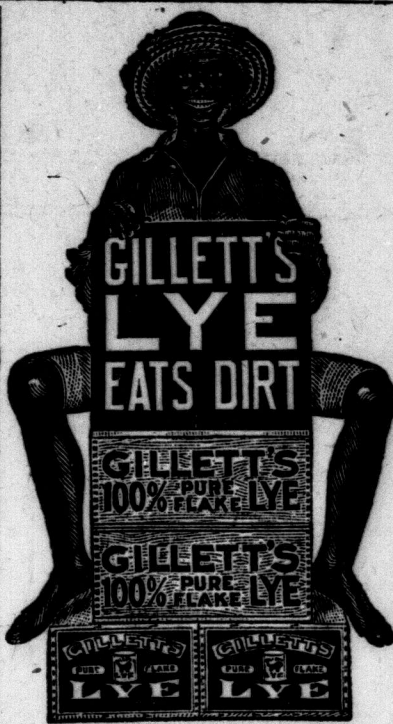

Brantford, Aug. 9.—That the fine two-story brick building occupied by the Mickle-Dymont & Son lumber concern at the time of the fire early Tuesday morning will be rebuilt is now practically certain.

Charles Mickle of Greenburgh, and O. W. Rhynas of Brantford, the latter manager of the local plant, inspected the ruins of the building on Colborne street this morning and afternoon in company with local building contractors. This afternoon Mr. Rhynas stated that the building will be sold either as it stands, if a satisfactory offer were made, or as a completed building, the restoration to be made by the company.

At the meeting of the board of works which is being held tonight it is understood that some discussion may arise in connection with the proposal freely made on the streets of Brantford since the disastrous fire of Tuesday morning that the building bylaw should be amended so that all garages will be forced to have concrete floors. The Dodge Service Station on Colborne street, which was blown to atoms, due to spontaneous combustion, causing an explosion of the ceiling, which was declared to be filled with gasoline fumes, caused by drippings through the ceiling and a wooden floor.

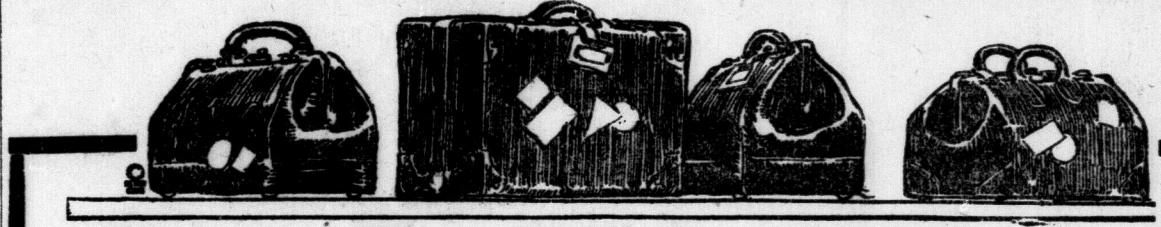
