

Throughout the day the soldiers and police had evdently refrained from at tempting to interfere with the strikers under the threats of the mutineers of the battleship to use her guns against them. Although it is possible that the quiescence of the soldiers was due to fear, the authorities think they are unreliable, and a regiment of dragoons and a brigade of artillery have beer sent to Odessa from Khersen. The troops should have arrived at Odessa this morning. With these reinforcements and the city under martial law


