Eastern States.

New York, Aug 25.—The *Herald's* London special says the English Ambassador gave a grand dinner to Admiral Farragut on Wednesday at his residence.

Henry J. Raymond returned much improved in health, by his European tour.

News was received at Bombay that the Neel had been proclaimed Amour of Ghazipur.

Baltimore, Aug 25.—Over ten thousand persons were at the Schutzenfest in this city. The vocal and instrumental music was very fine.

New York, Aug 25.—The *Herald's* special from White Sulphur Springs says, the meeting between Gen. Rosecrans and Confederate Generals assumes importance from the frequent interviews had. Both Southerners and Northerners are sanguine of the best results from the meeting.

Later advices from Hayti state that Salnave has been defeated, and is now acting solely on the defensive. He had forced a loan of two hundred thousand dollars. Two wealthy merchants have been in Europe to negotiate for the money. Rebel warships are blockading Genoa. Denunciations had taken place between Salnave and the British Minister.

New York, Aug 25.—The Atlantic Cable Company announce that after September 1st, the tariff on messages from this city to any part of Great Britain will be eleven dollars sixty cents and five mills in gold for ten words.

New York, Aug 25.—A letter from Rome says it is rumored that Cardinal Bonaparte will be appointed Archbishop of Pisa, which will make him Primate of the United States.

A letter from Florence expresses the opinion that a party recently working throughout Italy is preparing for another invasion. The hopes of Garibaldi are constantly traveling about the country holding interviews with leading Garibaldians. Other circumstances point to the probability of such intervention.

Chicago, Aug 25.—The Presidential campaign is growing very active in the north and northwestern States. Numbers of mass meetings are held, and great enthusiasm is manifested on both sides.

Hartford, Aug 25.—The campaign in Connecticut was opened by George F. Pendleton today.

New York, Aug 27.—Foreign advices by mail to Aug 15th have been received. It is rumored in English political circles that an understanding has been arrived at between Gladstone and the Roman Catholic Bishop of Ireland, that when the dissolution of the Irish Protestant Church is sanctioned by Parliament, he will be prepared to recommend a grant of one million pounds to Maynooth College as compensation for the abolition of the annual grant. This will be produced by the sale of an adequate portion of the landed estates of the Protestant Church.

Admiral Menkin was buried on the 13th in a portion of ground allotted to the Jews' cemetery, in Paris la Chaise. Several dramatic authors and theatrical friends attended.

A letter from Berlin says great importance is attached to the interview between the sovereigns of Russia and Prussia. A closer alliance of the two countries every day becomes more spoken of and probable.

The Reciprocity Treaty.

New York, Aug 28.—Seward has informed Congress that he has entered into negotiations with the British Minister Thornton for a Reciprocity Treaty with Canada. The new treaty forms a basis of negotiations which will soon be in a condition for transmission to the Imperial and Canadian Governments.

Nashville, Aug 28.—The Senate passed resolutions for joint special committee to wait on the President in person and ask that measures for the protection of the people of the State be adopted. The Legislature desire to exhaust all possible means for protection, before calling out the military.

Europe.

Liverpool, Aug 24.—Dispatches continue to be received giving accounts of shipwrecks caused by the recent gale. The ship *Favorite*, hence for New Orleans, is dismantled and in a sinking condition.

Florence, Aug 25.—News has been received of the death of Gen. Ealcio, one of the Spanish officers lately banished to the Canaries.

Despatches from Madrid say Prime Minister Gonsalves Boro contemplates a series of administrative reforms to relieve the popular discontent. It is rumored one of the reforms will be the reduction of the standing army, and the substitution of enlistment for conscription.

Florence, Aug 24.—The Italian Senate has ratified a convention with tobacco manufacturers.

Southampton, Aug 25.—The International Yacht Race at the Isle of Wight took place today. The following yachts came to the start.

Yacht, 122 tons; *Omara*, 126 tons; *Aliva*, 122 tons; *Cambria*, 185 tons; and the American Yacht the *Supho*. The *Cambria* won in six hours and a quarter; the *Aliva* was two minutes later; the *Omara* the third and the *Supho* last. The *Omara* was not pulled. The result was hailed with delight by the spectators.

London, Aug 25.—Notwithstanding the sharp opposition of a large portion of the British press, the Earl of Mayo, present Secretary of State for Ireland, will be appointed Governor General of India. He will leave in the *Elgin* in October to assume the duties of his office.

The charred remains of 32 victims of the recent terrible railway accident in Wales, were buried today.

London, Aug 25.—It is rumored that the Ocean Mail Service with the United States, via Southampton, will be discontinued, and the mails forwarded via Queenstown. This is in accordance with a proposition made by Mr. Trollope to the American Postmaster General.

Southampton, Aug 25.—The defeat of the yacht *Supho* yesterday, is explained by the fact that she was not in proper condition. Her hull and rigging having been damaged a few days since by a collision with another vessel, and her repairs incomplete. She encountered a series of provoking accidents during the race, but nevertheless made good time with a prospect of coming up to the other; when her bowsprit parted and her jibboom broke off, all efforts to win the race were then abandoned. Capt. Baldwin offers a new challenge to English yachts for a long run at sea.

London, Aug 27.—A Paris letter states that Napoleon declined to meet the Queen of Spain at Biarritz as she requested.

Paris, Aug 27.—Marshall Vaillant, Minister of the Emperor's household, made a speech at the opening of the Council general at Lyons, calculated to have a highly tranquilizing effect. He made a happy allusion to the big pacific speech of the Emperor, and assured the people they would enjoy prosperity and peace.

A Paris paper says France will accept the possibility of war if Prussia refuses to disarm.

Havana, Aug 28.—Advices from St. Domingo state the revolution to be progressing, and is becoming general.

London, Aug 27.—The Chamber of Deputies passed the bill to raise a loan of nineteen million francs; it also stated that half a million francs would be required for fortifications.

The Italian Prime Minister, Minister of the Interior, and Minister of the Treasury, have been appointed.

Paris, Aug 25.—Advices from Russia report that the Imperial troops had totally defeated and routed the rebel forces. There is great rejoicing at Peking over the result. The Imperial troops were assisted by European officers and engineers.

Washington, Aug 25.—The President has issued an order establishing Sitka as a port of call. The importation of fire arms, ammunition and distilled spirits is prohibited except under regulations of the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe when they may be shipped in limited quantities from the west coast of the United States and ports on the Pacific coast, to said port; and to said port only, on ships giving the Collector of Customs bonds conditioned that such articles on arrival at Sitka shall be delivered to the Collector of person acting as such, to remain until sold.

TELEGRAPHIC DISPATCHES.

Eastern States.

Detroit, Aug 25.—The steamship *William Tibbitts*, from Boston, while entering the harbor this evening, was struck by lightning, which tore in pieces the foremast and foremast and then passed into the pilot house, which was almost demolished. Captain Ingraham, who was in the pilot house, was seriously injured, and a young lady passenger prostrated by the stroke. Eugene Ingraham, the pilot, was so seriously hurt that his recovery was doubtful. The fluid passed along the wheel ropes to the rudder, and in its course knocked a man overboard, who was soon rescued however. None of the other passengers were injured. The hull of the steamer was not damaged.

Utica, Aug 25.—Dr. Peters of the Litchfield Observatory, discovered a new asteroid in a constellation.

Chicago, Aug 25.—The *Times* special says Attorney General Evans has indicated that the eight hours will constitute a day's work under the law of Congress. On his return he will submit a formal opinion, denying the right of Government to deduct wages as alleged by law.

One of the Washington administration papers announces that Secretary McCulloch, Browning, Randall and Wells will support Seymour and Blair. Secretary Seward has not yet made up his mind.

New York, Aug 25.—Within sixty days, eleven murders, 52 murderous assaults and 30 suicides have been chronicled in this city, besides the usual complement of minor outrages.

Samuel J. Beebe, one of the founders of the New York Exchange, died recently aged 83 years.

John Hoffman, French chemist, committed suicide today by taking corrosive sublimate.

Baltimore, Aug 25.—The prize fight between Edwards and Colyer lasted an hour and fourteen minutes. On the 47th round Edwards struck Colyer a terrific blow on the jugular, rendering him senseless for over fifteen minutes. Both men show signs of severe punishment.

A fight occurred between the roughs on a steamer going to the prize fight, in which knives, pistols, &c., were used. Several men were badly hurt.

The journeyman tailors of New York city last night organized for a strike.

St. Louis, Aug 25.—A dispatch from South Pass City announces that further Indian outrages have taken place. The Indians have made repeated attacks upon trains.

New York, Aug 25.—Last night shortly after the commencement of the performance of the play at Broadway Theatre several thieves and officers arrived with warrants issued by Judge Bardard for the arrest of D. H. Haskins, the present manager of the company. The officers attempted to force their way beyond the scenes. Being resisted in the attempt, they drew their revolvers and fired, wounding one man seriously and probably fatally, and wounding another. During the confusion Haskins escaped through the body of the house. The sheriff and officers were arrested, after which the performance proceeded. From all accounts it appears to have been a murderous assault by roughs employed as sheriff's deputies upon the frightened actors, who of course offered no resistance. The fellows fired two or three volleys into the midst of the groups on the stage. They have all been committed to await the results of the wounds they inflicted.

Barnstable, Mass., Aug 22.—Some unpleasantness has been caused at the Springfield Armory, in consequence of the men being notified that their pay would be cut down proportionately to the reduction in the hours of labor. The men have been working only eight hours since the passage of the new law.

New York, Aug 22.—The deaths this week are 731. Several persons who attended a Methodist camp meeting are said to have died from eating the meat of diseased cattle, sold there. The hog disease has broken out at Hempstead, Long Island.

Washington, Aug 22.—The Commissioner of the General Land Office has approved two contracts for surveys, one for the vicinity of Orestes and Idaho valleys, the other for a survey of San Luis valley, including a large number of American settlers in Swatow creek and the Mexican town of Canjio.

New York, Aug 22.—One of the most serious crimes ever perpetrated in this city was the arrest to-day of the entire board of Common Councilmen for contempt of Judge Barnard of the Supreme Court, in not obeying the injunction of said court. Writ for the arrest had been in the hands of the sheriff for several days but they could not be found. To-day the Council met by preconcerted arrangement at the city hall and proceeded to transact business, when the sheriff and deputies appeared and declared them all under arrest. They were marched to the Supreme Court room, but the court was not in session, the sheriff released them on their parole to appear on Tuesday. The whole affair is regarded as a farce.

It is stated that the enemies of Mr. Axtell, within the Democratic party, are circulating a letter for signature requesting him to withdraw or threatening to place a third candidate in the field in case he refuses.

Sonora, Aug 22.—Fry's steam quartz mill, eight miles from Sonora, on the Mountain Road, was burned yesterday. It was insured by the Fireman's Fund for \$6000.

Wheymeyer & Co.'s soap factory was burnt last night; loss \$3,300. It was insured in the Liverpool London and Globe Insurance companies for \$2,500. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

San Francisco, Aug 17.—Saturday night, Samuel Wade, who is partly paralyzed, tried to kill himself by cutting his throat with a butcher knife. He was discovered before he had time to accomplish the horrible deed, and was taken to the station house for safe keeping.

The steamer *Colorado*, which arrived yesterday, brought another consignment of Chinese women and girls. The Chinese company asked the aid of the police, who took the women to St. Mary's hospital, where they will be kept until properly provided for elsewhere.

Yesterday morning a Government official conferred a lot of optimism at the dock—a recent importation by the *Colorado*—much to the discomfort of an enterprising Celestial.

A few days since three soldiers named Swaney, Frank and King, deserted from Alcatraz Island, and undertook to swim to Lime Point, a distance of four miles. The sea was very boisterous, but the extraordinary and unprecedented feat was actually accomplished by King, in six hours and a half. Frank was drowned and Swaney was picked up off Fort Point, after having been in the water over five hours. They all started with a small raft of logs, which they used as buoys. King wrote from San Jose to the Colonel commanding Alcatraz Island, announcing his safety and sending his compliments to the staff.
