The Canadian Manufacturers' Association at their forthcoming convention will enquire into the alleged scarcity of skilled labor in Canada, and it is likely a commission will be appointed to investigate the matter. As a preliminary to these investigations, the following questions are being asked by letter in all the principal cities in Canada:

In what lines does shortage chiefly exist?

It was ascertained that in Vancouver there is a great scarcity of iron workers, moulders, machinists, pattern makers and boilermakers. The best wages paid are from \$3.25 to \$4 for a nine-hour day, but the laborers are unobtainable. Mr. Walkem, manager of the Vancouver Engineering Works and other managers of foundrys and machine shops stated that the cause of this shortage of labor was that the industry had advanced too fast for the supply of hands to carry it on.
