

AN ELECTRIC BOAT.

Something New in the Summer Recreation Business—Will Be a Storage Battery.

The Pointe de la Rivière Railway is building a 36-foot storage battery electric steamer, named "Mont Tremblant," to be put on the jib-bar and floating dry-dock route, in connection with the street car line. The steamer is experimental, but the inventor, Nick Lawson, is a very successful electrician, and anticipates no special difficulty. The steamer will use a 75-cell storage battery for 12 hours service, each cell being 15 inches deep and 14 1/2 inches in area. She will have no other motor than the battery, which will be between the beams and running on top of the keelson. Everything, including the motor, will be under sight, and all space will be devoted to passengers. The battery is to be charged at night from trolley wires. She will have a breadth of beam of 10 feet, a depth of 4 feet, and will be built for a regular speed of 15 miles an hour, which can be made 20 if need be.

The steamer is to be a part of a number to be placed on Puget Sound routes. Only two small boats of the kind are now in existence. One being an electric boat, but not to be put on the outside routes where the water is rough. The boat is to be housed over all, this will be arranged that everything except an awning can be removed. She will seat 15 persons, a reinforced car seat in the bow, and the hull is well under way, and she will be launched about July 1. As the boat will be without danger of explosion, but one man, the pilot, will be needed in charge. The inventor considers his invention revolutionary. He has been at work on the project for the past two years and has made improvements in cells. The electric boats are to be run as feeders to the street car line. Boston classes will be in great demand, and the discovery is held to have solved the problem of cheap sound navigation, which is hampered by naphtha and steam were proposed, but the cost of running and their capacity put them out of the question, and the scheme was abandoned. IMMIGRATION.

Some Interesting Figures From Canadian Statistics.

In 1882 Canadian immigration grew suddenly from 48,000, the number received in 1881, to 119,438; but in 1883 it fell to under 90,000 and in 1891 it was only 82,000. It is an interesting fact that more than two-thirds of the addition to the population of Quebec from abroad is made by Canadian who have tried to make their way in the United States, but having failed return to their own country. At least, this is the assertion of the official statistician in the year book for 1891. There is no evidence that this is more than mere opinion. Out of an immigration of 20,832 people into Quebec, 15,000 were Canadians, and only 1250 were English, Irish, Scotch, German and citizens of the United States. Out of an immigration of 9516 into Ontario 3064 were of the last-named peoples. There had gone to Ontario nearly two and a half times as many Englishmen, nearly twice as many Irishmen, more than three times as many Scotchmen, more than six times as many Germans, and four times as many Americans as had gone to Quebec. At the same time, three times as many Canadians had returned to Quebec as had gone back to Ontario.
