Assessments of Parks.

On motion of Ald. Shaw a bylaw was

Successful Sale of City Bonds Much gratification was expressed at the report of a sub-committee of the Executiva, stating that they have effected two sales

aggregating £187,844 7s. 2d. sterling 4 per cent. debentures at 98 13-16 per cent. de-livered in London, with English stamp duty of one-half of one per cent. paid by the city. This is one of the most favorable sales of this class of bonds which has been effected for some years, evidencing the high standing of the credit of the city in the British money market.

The last sale of city bonds was about two years ago. The price then realized was 96 1 the present transaction is 2 3-8 more.

More Money Bylaws.

Shaw gave particulars of the consolidation of these debentures: \$56,500 is for increased accommodation for Fublic schools, \$140,000 for Ashbridge's Bay, \$60,000 for Garrison Creek sewer, \$130,000 for King-street subway, \$125,000 for Don improvement and \$113,000 to redeem debentures maturing in 1894.
