As the course of the School of Pedagogy is

to be extended to one year—probably from September to May—a special examination will be held in December for those who failed at the last examination and for candidates eligible for examination without attendance at the School of Pedagogy.

By the interpretation clauses of the Public Schools Act passed at the last session of the Legislature, section 109 of the statute, is shown not to apply to any portion of township which forms a union school section with a town or incorporated village.

One hour each week must now be employed in teaching Temperance and Hypiene in every

Public School, and the inspectors are required to see that this regulation is carried out.

The revised regulations regarding Teachers' Institutes provide for only one meeting each year.

The new regulations regarding the Entrance Examination provide that the names of candidates passed or recommended shall not be published until after the decision of the Minister has been received. Of those who fail, only the following should be recommended: (a) Those who fail to reach the standard prescribed in some subject but who make considerable more than the apprepate marks required: (b) in some subject but who make considerable more than the aggregate marks required; (b) Those who in the opinion of the examiners, on account of age or for some special reason, should be recommended. There appears a general opinion in favor of advancing the standard for admission to High Schools. It may be seen, however, that examiners by closely following the regulations have it in their power to keep up a fair standard for admission.
