THE PROTESTANT ARCHBISHOP OF DUBLIN.

FEELING IN THE SENATE.

PARIS, Dec. 1.—Midnight.—The boulevard is calm. The Municipal Court is sitting with closed doors. When the members of the Cabinet visited the Elysee in the morning, M. Grey said: "If the Chamber and Senate really wish me to resign, they must acquaint me with their wish by some clear and unmistakable demonstration. The events of the past few days convince me that in the interests of the Republic I am bound not to resign. I have received from various parliamentary quarters communications asking me to remain in office, and until the wish of the Deputies and Senate is unmistakably clear that my resignation is desired, I shall remain in office. I believe that very soon I shall be able to form a Cabinet."

BISHOP CLEARY SPEAKS.

Bishop Cleary will leave for Rome in a few weeks. He has appointed Mr. Farrelly, of Belleville, administrator. In reply to his petition, the Bishop speaks of the late difficulties with the Kingston school board. He points out that many of his priests, nuns and most ardent Catholic members and school teachers received their education in the public schools, and adds: "In view of statements circulated, I deem it right to ask you to inform your congregation that the withdrawal of all Catholic pupils from the public schools of Kingston, in accordance with my pastoral instruction, in no wise affects the relations of the church with the public schools of the diocese, because episcopal action in the city has been determined by causes wholly exceptional and exclusively pertaining to the actual administration of the public schools in a city. I confidently hope and expect that the gentlemen who constitute the board of trustees for the direction of the public schools in your respective districts will never afford the same grounds of complaint as the public school board of Kingston has unhappily supplied. I have never heard of similar conduct in any of the missions. You have always

reported to me that the little ones are fairly treated by the teachers and trustees without bigotry or insult of religion. May this continue to be the rule everywhere. Say especially to young females who have come out of the public schools that the Bishop does not believe that they or their school companions of the Protestant faith or the female youth of Canada in general are either "immodest" or "immoral."
