QUEBEC—STOPPAGE OF WORK BY LONGSHOREMEN

On the orders of the day:

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Leader of the Opposition): My question is addressed to the Minister of Labour. In view of the worsening situation in connection with the strike of longshoremen at the St. Lawrence river ports, is the minister in a position to place before the house the optimistic possibility of an early settlement of this dispute? What does the government intend to do about it, with the ships piling up and exports being held back?

Hon. J. R. Nicholson (Minister of Labour): I am not in a position to make a report at this time, optimistic or otherwise. The government has seen fit to appoint an experienced mediator, who enjoys the confidence of both sides in this dispute. That mediator is sitting in Montreal at the moment, and I do not think the government should be asked to state what action—one way or the other—may be required until we have had a report from him.

Mr. Diefenbaker: What does the minister mean by that? Does he mean the dawdling on the part of the government is to continue? Is that what he means?

Mr. Nicholson: There has been no dawdling.
