If, as a result of the examination of the debtor by the official receiver, or the trustee's report, or again complaints received from creditors, the Superintendent of Bankruptcy has reasonable grounds to believe that an offence was committed to the Bankruptcy Act or to any other Act of the Parliament of Canada, an investigation is immediately initiated to determine if there is sufficient evidence to warrant the laying of charges before the courts.

## TRAINING OF NATO STUDENTS

Question No. 1,633—**Mr. Skoberg**:

1. How many NATO students have been trained during the following years: 1964-65, 1965-66, 1966-67, 1967-68 at all Canadian Forces Bases in Canada?

2. Has this training program been cancelled and, if so, for what reason?

3. Are countries that formerly used Canadian Bases for training NATO students now sending their students to the United States for training?

4. What did Canada charge for the training of each NATO student for each of the following years: 1964-65, 1965-66, 1966-67, 1967-68?

**Hon. Léo Cadieux (Minister of National Defence)**: "NATO students" are assumed to mean members of the armed forces of NATO member countries except Britain and the United States who have separate reciprocal agreements with Canada concerning training. 1. By Calendar Year: 1964, 98; 1965, 81; 1966, 66; 1967, 61; 1968, 55. In addition, a few vacancies for foreign officers to attend the Staff College at Kingston were offered to NATO countries. Pay and allowances, clothing, transportation to Canada and other personal expenses of a similar character were borne by the home country, with Canada providing transportation within Canada, normal hospital and medical services, as well as the cost of training. The numbers involved were: 1963-65, 2; 1965-66, 2; 1966-67, 3; 1967-68, 4.

2. The agreements concluded in July, 1964, providing for training of aircrew personnel from Denmark and Norway, expired on 30 June, 1968, and have not been renewed. The reasons are a matter for the Danish and Norwegian governments.

## ELLIOT LAKE—C.M.H.C. SALES

Question No. 1,638—**Mr. Foster**:

1. How many single family houses have been sold by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation in Elliot Lake in each of the past six years?

2. What was the average initial cost of the houses sold in each year?

3. What was the average cost of rehabilitating the houses sold in each year and what was the average selling price of the houses sold each year?

**Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of Transport)**:

1. 1963, 2; 1964, 2; 1965, 63; 1966, 162; 1967, 342; 1968, 273.

2. These houses were financed under the National Housing Act and were subsequently acquired by reason of mortgage default. Corporation records do not show initial cost of the houses. However, before a loan was granted a valuation was placed by the Corporation on each house specifically for setting of the loan amount. This value is considered to be a fair approximation of initial cost. The average original lending value for the houses sold in each year follows: 1963, \$11,750; 1964, \$11,925; 1965, \$12,681; 1966, \$12,405; 1967, \$12,559; 1968, \$12,377.

3. As Corporation records for Elliot Lake are maintained on a project basis, it is not possible to accurately relate rehabilitation costs to a specific house. It is, however, estimated that rehabilitation costs for the houses sold in each year averages as follows: 1963, \$200; 1964, \$200; 1965, \$200; 1966, \$500; 1967, \$2,100; 1968, \$3,900.

The progressive increase in costs is due to the fact that the units in the best condition
