Mr. MacInnis: I rise on a question of privilege, Mr. Speaker. In spite of the thinking of the Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) as to my reputation, namely, my not being a gentleman, I would call your attention to something which took place in this House a couple of nights ago. As a result of common courtesy on the part of members on this side of the House, including myself, the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce (Mr. Pepin) was allowed to take part a second time in a debate. It is too bad that this government cannot show us the same courtesy.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Speaker: Is the hon. member for St. John's East (Mr. McGrath) rising on a point of order?

Mr. McGrath: Mr. Speaker, I was rising to move that the hon. member for Cardigan (Mr. McQuaid) be now heard.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The Chair has already recognized the hon. member for Peel South.

Mr. Hyl Chappell (Peel South): Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

An hon. Member: Just what we need—a farmer from the city.

Mr. Chappell: Mr. Speaker, I join in this debate to call for an amendment to Bill C-259 to bring relief from the U.S. protective measures introduced on August 15.

Mr. MacInnis: I rise on a point of order, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The hon. member for Cape Breton-East Richmond (Mr. MacInnis) is rising on a point of order.

Mr. MacInnis: My point of order is one which I continue to raise in this House. I raise it again in this case because the hon. member is now trying to read his speech.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I hope the hon. member will not read the speech but will be guided only by the notes he may have before him. I appreciate the point raised by the hon. member for Cape Breton-East Richmond.

Mr. Chappell: Mr. Speaker, we have all heard of the import surcharge. The seriousness of its effect on Canada is apparent, but the employment support bill will do much to bring relief. We have also heard of the U.S. wage and prices freeze and appreciate the advantage it will give U.S. industry over Canadian industry if Canadian labour continues to push for increases in wages at a time when U.S. wages are frozen. One need only look at the Douglas Aircraft Corporation in Mississauga, in my riding, which employs 6,000 or 8,000 men. This company produces aircraft wings for assembly in California.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order.

Mr. Chappell: This company has already had to absorb—

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. Would the hon. member kindly resume his seat. The hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) is rising on a point of order.

Mr. Chappell: As I said in opening, Mr. Speaker, I join the debate to call for an amendment to Bill C-259 to bring relief from the U.S. protective measure introduced on August 15.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. Would the hon. member for Peel South kindly resume his seat. The point of order raised by the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre is that Bill C-259, with an amendment, is before the House and that hon. members who take part in the debate should make their remarks relevant to the bill and the amendment. I am sure the hon. member will want to take this suggestion into consideration.
