Miss K. Wilks of Crutcheon Farm, Gal., was second with Moka Bird, a grandly bred mare, by Moka. This is a particularly good mare, and the decision was between Medion and Moka Bird, but the former got the decision. Aviator, owned by Dominion Transport Co., and nicely handled by Isaac Watson, was awarded third prize.

Class No. 171 was for standard bred geldings or mares in class No. 165 were whipped right back.

CHANGES COMING IN CRIMINALITY

Whole Theory of Present Methods of Punishment is Wrong.

A CODE OF VENGEANCE

MONTREAL, Sept. 4.—(Special.)—The whole theory of present methods of punishment of criminals is wrong. This is the authoritative view of the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology, which is now holding its sessions in connection with the annual meeting of the American Bar Association. The members of the institute regard present punitive law as simply a code of vengeance, a barbarous relic of ancient times, which an eye was demanding for an eye, a tooth for a tooth. The institute would reverse this process, instead of continuing old and brutal laws, derived from bygone ages, the institute of Criminal Law and Criminology aims to substitute laws under which corrective influences will surround the prisoner and fit him properly for re-entrance into society.

It is for the purpose of achieving these results that the institute is organized. It is not a body that meets once a year, parades at a banquet, hears high-flown speeches and then promptly disperses to go thru the same routine the next year. The American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology is practically in continuous session the year round. Its members are constantly engaged in studying every aspect of criminology, receiving and publishing reports, statistics and articles, and seeking to find out just what measures will best promote the results it aims to bring about. It is also not a body merely for the education of its own members, but is larger in purpose to disseminate the facts that it gathers, so as to exercise an educative effect upon public opinion.

Some of the latest recent books on criminology by European writers, such as Prof. Enrico Ferri and others, have been translated and published under its auspices.

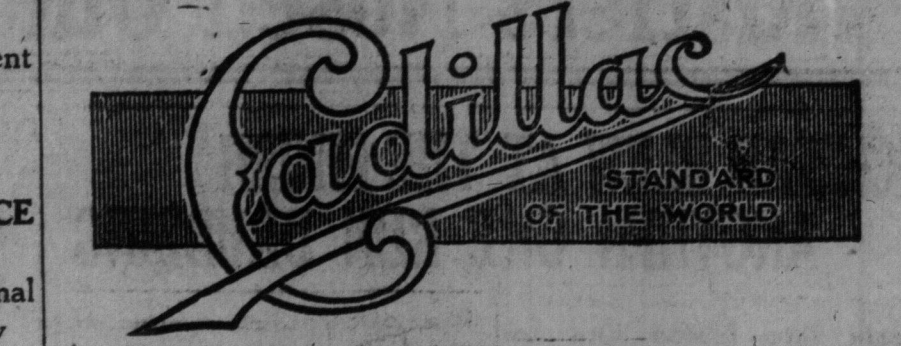
Distinguished Membership.

The members of the institute comprise the most distinguished criminologists, penologists and sociologists in the United States. The president is Orrin N. C. ter, justice of the supreme court of Illinois, and among its other officers are such notable men and women as Prof. Charles R. Henderson of the University of Chicago, Prof. Edward A. Ross of the Wisconsin State University, Jane Adams of Hull House, Chicago, Chief Justice John B. Winsor of the Wisconsin supreme court, Justice Charles A. De Courcy of the supreme judicial court of Massachusetts and many other similar authorities.

From motives of judicial propriety, Judge Carter could not allow himself to be quoted, but he and other members indicated the nature of the work and the point of view of the institute. The chief changes thus far accomplished have been along the lines of the probation and parole system, es-pecially in the juvenile offenders.

It is not so long ago in both the United States and Canada when mere boys for some trivial offence were sentenced to penitentiaries and there subjected to the same fearful severe rules and treatment as adult offenders. Some recent years the practice of herding prisoners of all ages and conditions together, thus making the jails and prisons training schools of crime.

for the young, in some places this system still prevails, but it is gradually being abolished.

Probation and Parole.

More recently probation and parole system has been extended to adult prisoners, and this has now been supplemented by the system of putting prisoners on their honor. In the state prison at Canon City, Colorado, the warden has put large numbers of the men on their honor while using them building roads. No armed guards stand ominously over them and no coercive or intimidatory measures are used. These prisoners built the great sky line drive along the grand canon on the Arkansas River. This is the most wonderful scenic road in the world. Not a man made trouble, nor was there a single escape, nor did any of the men desert.

The state of Massachusetts has now adopted the honor system in dealing with chronic drunkards. The American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology has gathered an immense amount of data concerning the liquor question. Its attitude is, after a careful weighing of the facts, that prohibition, so far as the cities are concerned, is impracticable and futile and can never be enforced. In all communities, both urban and rural, where the majority do not actually practice prohibition for more than half a century, yet the annual number of commitments for drunkenness and for crimes to drink is enormous. This statistics show, in both as to cities and country districts. In the case of summary liquor laws the institute believes that reasonable regulations form the best policy, and that under them there is not the secret selling of hard intoxicating liquor superadded to the lawlessness, perjury, hypocrisy and general demoralization that always exist under an unenforceable prohibition.


Solitary Cells.

Another subject that the institute is examining is the solitary cell. Does the putting of a hardened criminal in a solitary cell reform him? Does it produce good results for society? The members of the institute have not arrived at the point where they are prepared to express a definite opinion.
