#### **AUSTRIA IN NEED** OF A BIG LOAN

Thirty Million Dollars Required to Cover Up Year's Deficit.

VIENNA. Oct. 22.—(Can. Press.)—
Loans amounting to nearly \$30.000.000
will be necessary to meet the deficit in
the Austrian budget for the first half of
1914. This so-called transition budget intended to pave the way for transferring
the date of the beginning of the fiscal
year from January to July, estimates the
expenditure for the six months at \$312,891,776, and the proceeds of the loans required to balance the deficit between the
revenue and expenditure will be applied
to the army, the navy and the railroads.
Baron Engel Von Mainfelden, in introducing the budget today in the lower
house of the Austrian Parliament, explained that this "unfavorable budget"
was due to recent events in the Balkans,
but that the economic organism of the

British Press Deems Misunderstanding Serious One That Should Be Removed.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—(Can. Press)—"It cannot be denied that President Wilson had some grounds for complaint against the British policy in Mexico," says The Globe, in commenting today on the Mexican situation. The newspaper considers that a grave mistake was made by the British foreign office in its overhasty recognition of Provisional President Huerta, which was in such marked contrast with its dignified delay in recognizing King Peter of Servia.

The Globe advances the view that the foreign office attitude lends color to the suspicion that its policy is dictated rather by political considerations than by regard for the real interests of the nation.


