BRITISH AND OLYMPIC GAMES **NEW LEAGUE RAISING FUNDS**

Scheme to Get the Half Million Wherein the Olympic Council Failed-Organizers Hope to Accomplish What is Necessary for Proper Athletic Representation at Games in Berlin.

Old England is not yet thru with an effort to land the Olympic honors at Berliin. The public was asked to subscribe \$500,000, and in response contributed a spares \$50,000, which is obylously inadequate for carrying out any broad scheme for preparation, even for covering the cost of transport of the team.

Now a British athletic league is being organized to get the money that the Olympic committee couldn't.

This scheme is bost ambitious in scope and its sponsors believe that it will, if carried into effect, accomplish two things dom to be properly represented at the Olympic games, and (2) institute an elaborate system under which it will be impossible for promising athletes to be overlooked. Roughly, the Idea is that the league should have headquarters in London.
