The question of the amount of added matters which may be permitted is serious, from the point of view of the use of mustard as a domestic remedy, in blisters, poultices, emetics, &c. The mustard of the pharmacopecias permits of no admixture. Mustard as a condiment is another matter, and the public should learn to recognize the distinction between the two. Condimental justard may be regarded as a substitute, in emergency, for the pharmacopæal mustard, but by no means to be confused with this last.

But even as a condiment, there is a degree of dilution which amounts to fraud. The fixing of limits defining mustard for condimental purposes is under consideration. The problem is not a simple one, at a mot yet in a position to submit a formal solution. I would respectfully reco. d the publication of this report as Bulletin
